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ISLANDER WRITES FROM MISSION FIELD IN FAR AWAY CHINA

New Year Sees Critical Conditions in Far East, Writes Rev. Father Morrison, Who Extends Best Wishes To All Guardian Readers.

Conditions in China are summed up in an interesting communication received by The Guardian from Rev. Vincent Morrison, former Prince Edward Islander in charge of the Catholic Mission at Sung Yang, Chekiang, China, who writes under date of January 24: "The government forces seem to have the victory over the Fuking rebels, and no negotiations are in progress for a settlement. It is reported that there will be quite a number of executions of the main participants, and that Generalissimo Chiang will be retained as commander in chief of the Chinese Military forces. "The outlook for China and the Far East is entirely problematical and the prospects for the coming year even more critical than in other parts of the world. With Dr. H. H. Kung as minister of finance we hope that he will be able to raise the necessary funds to keep the ship of state afloat, and that his efforts will lead to a solution of the problems in the best interests of all concerned. "Rev. Father Morrison adds kind words of appreciation of The Guardian, to which he has been a subscriber for many years. "It is like a letter from home," he says, "and I enjoy reading every issue with all the news, both local and foreign. He extends his best wishes to the staff and to all Guardian readers."

FORMER ISLANDER SIGNALLY HONORED ON 86TH BIRTHDAY

Ar. Benjamin Darby Hailed As Dean of United States Publishers At Memorable Function In Owatonna, Minnesota.

The Guardian is in receipt of an interesting copy of the Feb. 18 issue of the People's Press of Owatonna, Steeles County, Minnesota, U. S., describing the tribute paid to the proprietor, Mr. Benjamin E. Darby, the oldest active publisher in the United States, on the occasion of his eighty-sixth birthday and sixtieth anniversary of his newspaper career at Owatonna. The function took the form of a testimonial dinner in which Mr. Darby was the recipient of a trophy from the Junior Chamber of Commerce for his community service, of a milk pail from the business and professional men, and of a score of telegrams with anniversary greetings and well wishes, and congratulatory addresses by editors, publishers and newspapermen from all parts of the State. Mr. Darby, a native of St. Elias, this Province, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Darby, and has many relatives here. He received his education in Charlottetown, where he graduated from Prince of Wales College. He went to United States in 1871, and taught school in a number of places in Minnesota before settling down at Owatonna in 1874 and establishing the People's Press, which he has since conducted with marked ability and success. Associated with him in his business are his three sons, George F., Harry B. and William H. Darby. In addition to his newspaper business, Mr. Darby served as a member of the Owatonna Board of Education, the Public Library Board, the City Hospital Board, and as secretary of the Owatonna Fire Department. The eulogies which he received on his recent anniversary from outstanding citizens including Mr. Lawrence G. Hodgson, a newspaper colleague and former Mayor of St. Paul, evidenced the high esteem in which this sterling Prince Edward Islander is held in the community of his adoption. The Guardian takes this opportunity of joining with Mr. Darby's many friends at home and abroad in wishing him continued prosperity and success.

To Revise Air Mail Contracts

(By Sam Bledsoe) (Associated Press Staff Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 23—From the House of Representatives post office committee today came a clear indication that the carriers of the air mail contract cancellations who flew the United States air mail up until Monday may be given an opportunity to carry it once more. Chairman James Mead said at the hearing on proposed permanent air mail legislation to supplant present law. "This committee," Mead said, "is willing to give consideration to an amendment that would let these carriers come back and bid on new contracts." Thomas E. Doe, official of the eastern air transport, which had a contract until the government took it away, was testifying at the time and he smiled in agreement with the spirit of Mead's words. At the same time, the Senate air mail committee which made the disclosures that were the basis for the air mail contract cancellations was listening to Walter F. Brown former postmaster general, conclude his four days on the stand. Canada maintained her position last year as the leading supplier of both wheat and flour to the United Kingdom.
