S' side Native To Speak At Worcester

MacDowell of 422 Washington Street, Weylesley, a native of Summerside, Prince Edward Island, and a graduate of the Prince of Wales College at Charlottetown, P. E. I., will speak at the Economics Seminar of the Department of Economics and Sociology, Clark University, this city, Thursday afternoon. Mr. MacDowell is a graduate student, majoring in economics, at Clark. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. MacDowell of Summerside, P. E. I., and was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Arts by Dalhousie University in May, 1947. During World War II he served with the Canadian Army in Canada, England, and Northwestern Europe from September, 1940, to January, 1946. At Thursday's Seminar at Clark, Mr. MacDowell will discuss "The European Recovery Program."

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. RODERICK A. McDOUGALL The death of Mrs. Roderick A. McDougall occurred on Saturday, December 4th, about 10:30 p.m., at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James W. O'Brien with whom she resided for the past number of years.

The deceased had been enjoying good health and was leading an active normal life, having assisted her daughter with various household tasks during the day as was her custom, and had retired at her usual time. Upon retirement for the night, Mrs. O'Brien went to her mother's bedside to find her in a spasm of pain which proved to be a fatal heart attack. Dr. W. A. Shea of Alberton and Rev. W. E. Monaghan, her parish priest were hastily summoned but the Angel of Death claimed her for his own in about fifteen minutes. Rev. Father Monaghan gave her the Sacrament of Extreme Unction upon her arrival. By strange coincidence she had attended Mass in the parish church at Alberton on the day previous to her death which was the first Friday of the month. On this day she received Holy Communion for the last time. The late Mrs. McDougall whose maiden name was Mary Lawlor was born in Antigonish, Nova Scotia on June 26, 1880 and was twice married. Her first husband, Stephen MacKinnon of Grand River passed away about fifty years ago and her second husband, Roderick McDougall also of Grand River predeceased her by about thirty years.

Left to mourn are three sons, five daughters, three stepsons and one step daughter, as well as a large number of grand children and several great grandchildren. 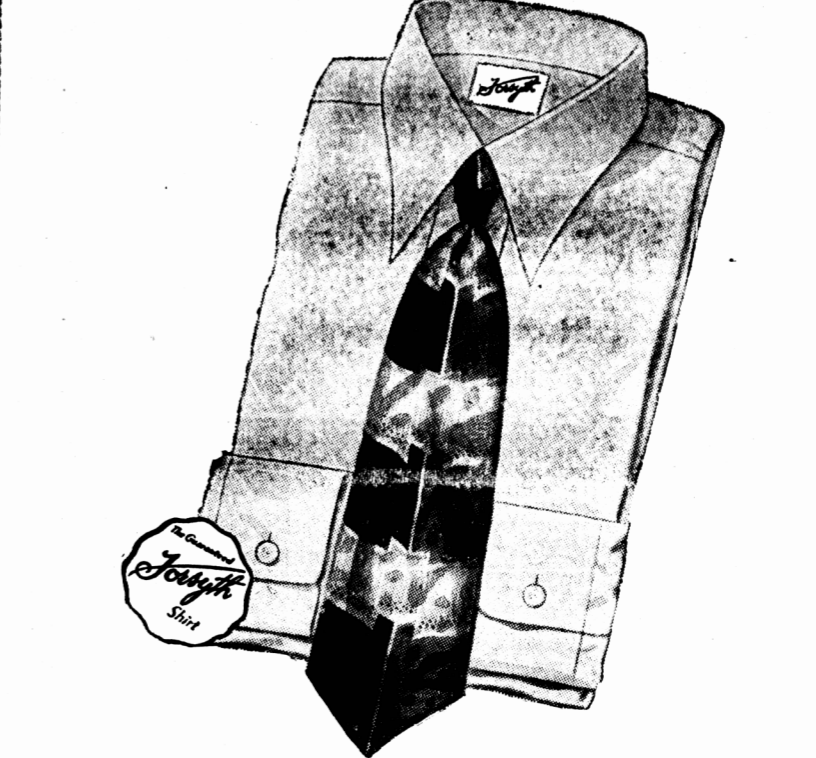

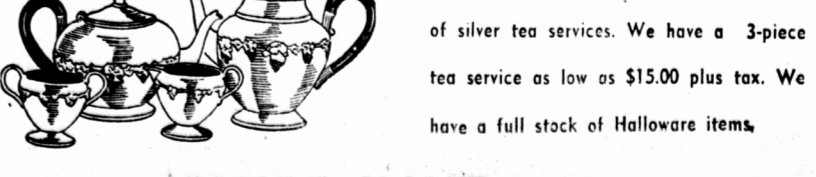
