VANCOUVER G. W. V. A. EXCLUDE ORIENTALS

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 15.—Declaring that the oriental laborer was a detriment to Canada, members of the G. W. V. A. last night passed a resolution asking that the Government prevent further immigration of

this class for a period of two years. Strong protests were lodged against immigration of Chinese as students. The meeting further went on record with a resolution that foreigners who served with the Canadian Expeditionary forces overseas be given full citizenship.

TRYON DRIVING CLUB

The annual meeting of the Tryon Driving Club was held in the office of the secretary, J. A. Lyman, on Monday evening, March 10th. The secretary reviewed the financial statement of the club. \$169.00 was collected, \$127.00 being paid out in four months held on the Tryon River. All bills paid leaves a balance in the treasury.

After the business was disposed of a discussion took place in regard to the future of the Club. Those taking part were Messrs. W. M. Lea, M.P.P., S. N. Dawson, G. C. Holland, J. A. Lyman, Louis H. Howatt and others. On motion of Mr. L. H. Howatt, seconded by Mr. W. M. Lea, the meeting adjourned to meet again at the call of the secretary, to devise ways and means of acquiring or leasing a track for the summer months, on putting on the first race under the auspices of the Tryon Driving Club. The president, Mr. L. H. Howatt, in pointing out the aims of the association, said:

Ladies and Gentlemen: I would like your attention for a few moments. I have a few remarks to make, and will try to be brief. Now, I may say that I am pleased to see so many present on this occasion, and speaking in my official capacity as president of the Tryon Driving Club, I extend to you all a very hearty welcome. I am glad to see so many ladies with us this afternoon, and as the ladies lend tone to gatherings of this kind I have much pleasure in extending to them a very cordial welcome indeed. And it is needless for me to say that I hope nothing will happen by word or deed to mar the pleasure or be grating on the ear of the most fastidious. Now, since coming before you on the fifth, the date of our last meet, things have been happening. We had a meeting on last Tuesday evening which was attended by the representative horsemen of Cape Traverse, Augustine Cove, Tryon and Victoria, and I think all who were present on that occasion will agree with me when I say that from a social standpoint at least our meeting was a great success. We succeeded in forming the foundation of what I feel assured will grow into a very strong organization. Now, what are the aims of this association, and what benefits will accrue from an organization of this kind in our community?

If you will follow me very closely I will endeavor to the best of my ability to point out to you the reasons I have to put before you of forming an association of this kind. If you will allow me to make a few comparisons this afternoon, I will be better able to put more clearly before you what I have in mind. If you will allow your minds to go back a few years when all our butter was manufactured at home. The advent of the creameries which we see on every hand has changed the old methods. Was it a change for the better or the worse? I will not attempt to answer that question, for we see so many evidences of the great boon those co-operative creameries have been to the farmers in this and surrounding communities that we are convinced the advent of those industries in our midst meant the dawning of better days for the farmers of this fair Isle, which has been aptly named "The Garden of the Gulf."

Before those plants were in operation people generally took little pride in their stock, sending our milk to one central station brought about that spirit of friendly rivalry which is so essential as an impetus to our best efforts. As a result we have built up

some of the finest herds of dairy cattle in the world. And the point I wish to make is, no matter what you attempt, system, organization and united effort are the most important essentials.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, the aims of this association are fundamentally the same, only we intend to develop along other lines, namely, the development of the light harness horse. A body of men who promote a creamery or a knitting mill are looked on as benefactors, but those who promote a racing association are apt to be looked on with suspicion and it is partly to remove this undesired prejudice that I am speaking to you this afternoon.

There have been many cases under my own observation of men who by driving their horses over a speedway such as we have here, or winning a race such as we are going to put on this afternoon have found their horses come suddenly in the limelight, much enhanced in value, where otherwise they would have gone down to their graves as the poet says, "unwept, unhonored and unsung."

It is an accredited fact that the section of country embraced by this association can boast of having the best looking women and the finest horses to be found anywhere, had we some way to bring them before the public—the horse, not the ladies, I mean. This will be one of the most important functions of our club, to keep a list of good drivers that are for sale, so when enquiries come in the secretary will be able to locate them. Consequently, when buyers come here from other provinces, looking for classy drives with a dash of speed they go to the centre, where the people are progressive and have a driving club, as the most likely place to meet their requirements. Cases have come to my notice where buyers looking for such as I have mentioned would go to Long River, where they have a club such as we have formed here, and have made such a success of breeding and educating the light harness horse along scientific lines.

Now, I may say that since the forming of this association we have received a great deal of encouragement and friendly advice, but, although thankful for any words of encouragement, we require something more substantial to keep this track clear and provide prizes from week to week. Now, I claim it by perfecting this association we can enhance the value of every driving horse twenty-five to fifty per cent. and can interest the young men in a clean, manly sport which has been termed the sport of kings. We are as much entitled to your recognition and support as the men who promoted a creamery, a knitting mill, or make two blades of grass where one grew before. I want every man here who has the interest of this community at heart, every man who wants to make this a better community to live in, every man who wants to cultivate the social side of his nature, every man who wants to put the old Tryon River on the map as one of the principal racing centres in the Maritime
