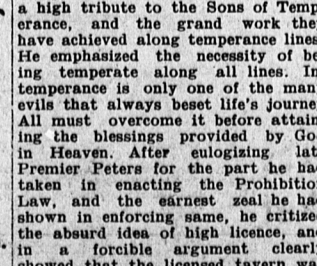

Test for Astigmatism

A Providence, R. I. exchange contains the following: "The ever-present problem of communication with the mainland is, with the advent of winter, again agitating the residents of Prince Edward Island, the smallest province in the Canadian Confederation. At the present time two projects looking to the relief of an almost intolerable situation, in which trade and commerce are oftentimes at a standstill, are under discussion and will be presented to the Dominion Parliament at Ottawa for consideration. One of these projects has been talked of for years and calls for the construction of a tunnel under Northumberland Straits, connecting Prince Edward Island with the New Brunswick shore at the narrowest part of the straits, where the island is only nine miles distant from the mainland. This would involve the estimated expenditure of \$10,000,000. The other project which is the latest to be discussed, and which, on account of its apparent economy has met with considerable favor, provides for the construction of ice-breaking steamers of great power and the most approved construction. The present ice-breakers in commission are unable to maintain an uninterrupted service between the mainland and the island and often for weeks at a time navigation is wholly cut off. The new plan calls for the abandonment of the present winter route between Pictou, N.S., and Georgetown, at the easterly end of Prince Edward Island, and substitutes therefore a new route between Tatamagouche, N.S., and Charlottetown. The objection to the Pictou-Georgetown route is that Pictou harbor is exposed to the prevailing easterly and northeasterly winter winds and becomes choked with drift ice, which presents a barrier impossible of passage by any steamer, no matter how great her power. Added to this is the fact that the great bulk of freight and the majority of the passengers are destined for Charlottetown or points to the westward of this city, and in making Georgetown the winter terminus of the line the merchants are obliged to pay increased freight charges on account of the longer haul."
