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Great Britain Sends Troops To Egypt

STRONG MEASURES FOLLOW ASSASSINATION

Of Sirdar — British Cabinet Approves Demands on Egyptian Govt.

TO CLEAR SUDAN

Ships on Way — Steps Taken to Protect British Residents

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 24. — Lord Allenby, British High Commissioner at noon today informed the Egyptian Premier, Zaghoul Pasha, that instructions had been given for the British forces to occupy the Alexandria Customs. This he said, was the first measure to be taken in consequence of Egypt's non-acceptance of all British demands following the assassination of Sir Lee Stack, Sirdar. The indemnity of £500,000 demanded by the British for the death of the Sirdar was paid by the Egyptian government at 11.45 o'clock this morning.

The Admiralty has ordered the super dreadnought Iron Duke to Alexandria, Egypt. The battleship Malaya, to Port Said, and the cruiser Carados and two destroyers to the Sudan.

Crisis Eased

LONDON, Nov. 24. — That the Egyptian crisis has been greatly eased by the resignation of Premier Zaghoul Pasha is the view understood to have prevailed at an hour and half session of the cabinet called this noon to consider the Egyptian reply to the British demands.

Extradition Granted In Case Of Leo Koretz

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Judge W. Wallace of the county court, today granted extradition papers in the case of Leo Koretz, wanted in Chicago on a series of embezzlement charges running into millions of dollars.

Shorn of the beard with which he had disguised himself while in Nova Scotia, he admitted his identity admitted that a prime facie case existed in Cook County, Illinois, on charges set out in warrant of his arrest, waived all extradition proceedings and expressed the hope that he would be able to proceed to Chicago at the earliest possible moment.

One Dead, Two Injured in Mfld. Railway Accident

ST. JOHN'S, Mfld. Nov. 24.—One dead and two injured is the result of the derailment of a working train on the Newfoundland Government Railway at Manuels this morning. Engineer Fred Tipler was killed and Fireman Johnson had his legs broken. Conductor Roswell was also injured.

Quebec Commission Agents Seize \$400,000 Worth at St. Sulpice.

WERE TIPPED OFF

Found on Barge and Captain Placed Under Arrest

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—The captain of the barge "A Tremblay," seized at St. Sulpice, L'Assomption County, this morning with over \$400,000 worth of liquor aboard, is under arrest.

The local customs officials confirmed the report of the seizure this afternoon.

The barge put into Victoria Basin here at noon.

Quebec Commission Inspectors, Laforest, Couture, and Masse of Quebec, raided a barge and seized liquor valued at over \$400,000 at St. Sulpice, L'Assomption county today.

This is the most important seizure ever made by Provincial or Federal revenue men. There was no resistance by the parties in charge of the stock.

FINDS LEWIS BEVIS GUILTY OF MURDER

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Lewis Bevis, on trial for the second time on a charge of murdering Police Officer Charles Fulton last July when the officer was shot dead while pursuing Bevis, was found guilty late yesterday afternoon. The jury was out one hour and twenty minutes and returned a verdict of guilty with a recommendation for mercy.

At his first trial the jury disagreed. Bevis heard the verdict unmoved and coolly lit a cigarette as he left the prisoner's dock to return to the cells. He will be sentenced some time this week.

ARMISTICE ENDS 31 YEAR WAR IN MOROCCO

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Following a consultation between the Spanish representative in Morocco and Abd El Krim, rebel leader, an arrangement has been reached by which an armistice will be signed between Spain and the rebellious tribesmen immediately the Spanish troops have retired behind lines agreed upon, according to information received by the Daily Mail from Spain. The despatch adds that an armistice will end the disastrous war which has lasted since 1893.

NEW SECURITY PLAN FOR FRANCE SOUGHT

Dominions May Be Summoned to New Imperial Conference

PROTOCOL DEAD

Question of Russian Attitude Towards England Also In Doubt.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—An Imperial conference may have to be summoned to determine the attitude of the Dominions on the Geneva protocol and the approval of an alternative scheme that will give some sort of security to France which is the course which France would prefer.

The Dominions have already been asked to express their opinions regarding the protocol, especially in the matter of the Japanese amendments, and the placing of the British navy at the disposal of the league in times of threat or of actual hostilities. The protocol itself, however, is really a dead letter and what the British are now eager to find out is how far the Dominions will subscribe to some alternative scheme to give France security.
