Ellworth was committed to jail to await trial in the Supreme Court on the charge of stealing brass fittings from the Messrs. Batt. Mr. McNeill served breakfast and opened Ellworth's door shortly after six o'clock in the morning, he was lying down. The door was not wide open. When Mr. McNeill's back was turned he went up stairs and hid under the desk in the chapel. When everything was quiet he went out into the yard and with the aid of a wheelbarrow and a piece of plank climbed over the fence. Mr. McNeill and Mr. Gillespie were at breakfast. At half past seven the plank was noticed against the fence and immediate inquiry was made and it was found that the man suspected had flown. It is said that Ellworth secured a boat and got away from the city.
