### THE DEATH OF ANNE STEVENSON.

It is with deep regret that The Guardian records the death, after 8 months of most patient suffering of Anne Stevenson, beloved widow of the late John L. Smith, and who departed this life at her residence, New Glasgow, on the afternoon of June 24th, 1912, aged 79 years. Her husband had predeceased her but two months before.

Last October while going about her work as usual, she was suddenly prostrated with some unknown disease and was never able to rise again. Notwithstanding all that loving and tender hands of sons and daughters and a nurse could do, she finally passed away. At times and in the specially weary patient moments of her prolonged sickness, she longed "to go home" and be at rest; and it was when the blossoms began to fall, she felt that like them, she too must pass away, and enter the larger service of the life beyond.

Peace! perfect peace! with loved ones far away! In Jesus' keeping we are safe, and they, Peace! perfect peace! death shadowing us and ours! Jesus has vanquished death and all its powers.

Mrs. Smith was a descendant of noble Scotch ancestors, who emigrated from Scotland to Prince Edward Island years ago, making New Glasgow their home, where the deceased was born and where she resided and spent her active, busy life. She was the youngest daughter of the late Elder, John Stevenson, Jr., and grand-daughter of Elder, John Stevenson, Sr., pioneer preacher and founder of the Church of Christ, New Glasgow. She came from a humble, devoted, Bible-loving people, and this in a large measure accounted for her deep, pious, religious nature and love for God's word, and the wonderful story there unfolded.

Being born in a Christian home, she had the training that laid the foundation for a noble Christian character. As a young girl she had high and lofty ideals, and was noted among her associates, and was noted for her pure, modest, unselfish life. In early womanhood, under the sweet influence of the love of God, she gave her heart to her Saviour, was baptised by the late Elder, D. Crawford, uniting with the Church of Christ, New Glasgow, and remaining a faithful and consistent member until the end.

Then, too, her mind was open to all the good, the true and the beautiful in nature. She loved the trees, the flowers, and birds, and all things great and small. God had made, and took great delight in making beautiful her home surroundings.

Here was a sunny, cheerful, optimistic temperament, and rarely did she ever become gloomy or despondent.

She was a woman of good executive ability, wise in counsel, sound in judgment, self-reliant, conscientious, independent in mind, known for her frolic, and yet modest with all.

She believed that work was a divinely appointed task and that it was a sin to be idle. God worked, she believed, and we should be "co-workers together with Him." Thus "she looked well to the ways of her household and ate not the bread of idleness." When her hands were not busy she would be found storing her mind with the rich treasures of literature. She read widely and many books—medicine, theology, poetry, history.

She was the honored mother of a large family, and was ambitious that they would do good in the world. To this end she did what she could to educate those who so desired, and help the others to get a start in life. She saw some of her children become teachers, two of her sons become ministers of the Gospel she loved so well. In all she did she was self-sacrificing and yet felt she had done nothing. But the good she tried to do will stand as if "were done, God finishes the work by noble souls begun. She hated sin in every shape and form and loved the good and the beautiful. She was the fountain and

inspiration of her family, and rightly nobly did she do her work. The sore and painful affliction she endured during the closing months of her life she bore with Christian fortitude and patience. In a happy, meek, cheerful spirit, sustained by an unflinching trust in her Saviour and the faithful ministry of her family. The filial devotion of her sons, and daughters during their mother's invalidism, is worthy of commendation. 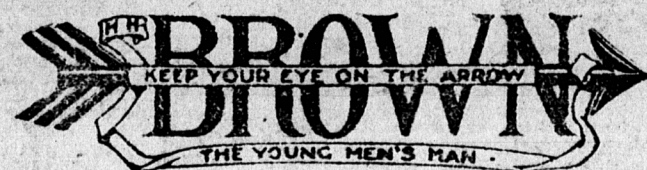
