MONDAY

A large and enthusiastic meeting of the P. E. Island Horsemen's Association was held in Charlottetown on Thursday evening last. The Secretary, Mrs. F. C. Bisset, gave a report of the year's work which was very satisfactory, the finances being reported to be in healthy condition. It was decided to recommend to the Charlottetown Driving Park Association the following classes for their June Meet:—2.19 trot, mile heats; 2.24 trot and 2.30 pace, half mile heats.

A lively discussion took place in regard to the existing freight rates for the transport of race horses and the committee consisting of Messrs. F. C. Brown, J. S. Wedlock and H. H. Horns were appointed to wait on Messrs. Hayes and Story to try and secure a lower freight rate. The Secretary was instructed to write to the various Horsemen Associations throughout the Maritime Provinces asking their co-operation in this matter.

The meeting was also unanimous in the opinion that the time had arrived, either to make a reduction in the entrance money or the amount deducted from the money winners. Horsemen, it was stated, felt that the cost of maintaining and racing horses had now advanced so materially, that track owners should offer greater inducements in order to give the horse-owners a chance to come out at least square with the game.

THE MINTO.—The C. G. S. Minto, left Charlottetown yesterday morning at 6 o'clock and proceeded to Summerside where she opened the harbor at that port. At 9 o'clock she encountered the first heavy fog in some places between 7 and 8 feet thick, but was being towed by tug and docked at 1.30 o'clock. This morning she leaves Summerside at daylight, enroute to Charlottetown where she is expected at about 6.30 o'clock. After taking on the mails, freight and passengers she will proceed to Pictou, on the usual route.
