RAILWAY ACCIDENT

20 Men Caught and Four Drowned.

HON. PETER MITCHELL

Has Another Attack of Paralysis—Gov't Chicken Fattening Stations.

OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—(Special)—The Hon. Peter Mitchell had another attack of paralysis today.

The Government will this fall establish a number of chicken fattening stations in the Maritime Provinces.

HALIFAX Aug. 21.—(Special)—By the flooding of a caisson on the Midland Railway bridge over the Shubenacadie, on Sunday 20 men were caught. Sixteen of them got out but were more or less bruised, while 4 were drowned.

Three belonged to New York, the fourth was an Irishman.

These make seven deaths on the Midland Railway since the construction commenced.

DOES NOT ACCEPT

The Proposal for Joint Commission.

MAKES NEW PROPOSALS

The Pope Receives 300 People and Appeared in Excellent Health.

CAPE TOWN Aug. 21.—(Special).—

The Transvaal has forwarded an answer to England. It does not accept the proposal for joint commission but makes a number of fresh proposals.

London, Aug. 20.—Lieutenant General Sir Frederick Walker, who relieves General Sir William Buller, as commander of the British troops in South Africa, sailed for his post to-day. He was accorded an enthusiastic farewell by the crowds at the Waterloo station.

New York, Aug. 19.—The Washington correspondent of the Herald says: "In a report received at the navy department from Rear-Admiral Howison that officer describes the tension existing between the Transvaal and Great Britain, and his report indicates that war may be precipitated by the hot headedness of the Boers.

Though Admiral Howison was not sent to the Transvaal upon any diplomatic mission, he went to the country when the Chicago arrived at Delagoa Bay last month, and joined the ship at Cape Town, after having made a careful study of the conditions prevailing in the sections through which he passed.

It would not be surprising in the event of war, said Admiral Howison, if the British Government requires the United States to take care of its interests in the Transvaal and a ship from the South Atlantic will undoubtedly be sent to Delagoa Bay to look out for American interests.

According to Rear-Admiral Howison there can be only one result of a war between Great Britain and the South African republic—the absorption of the latter country. The Boers are determined, however, to fight for their independence.

It is apparent that Admiral Howison sympathizes with the British and he says they pay five-ninths of the taxes and represent three-fifths of the wealth of the country.

Admiral Howison describes the mines as fabulously rich and devotes a portion of his report to the characteristics of the Boers. He says they are very superstitious and mentions the declaration of the Volksraad to pass a bill for ridding the country of the grass hopper scourge and for overcoming the effects of drought, the reason given being that it would be unwise to attempt to thwart the will of providence.

ROME Aug. 21.—(Special)—The Pope granted an audience of over an hour to three hundred persons and appeared in excellent health and spirits.

TRIAL OF DREYFUS

All the Witnesses Examined were Hostile.

EXCITING COURT SCENE

The Court Adjourns Amid the Shouts and Hisses of The Crowd.

RENNES, Aug. 21.—[Special]—The two weeks of the Dreyfus trial opened today.

All the witnesses examined were hostile to Dreyfus but Demange handled them very skilfully and made a favorable impression.

The session wound up with an exciting scene at which Col. Pequet, asked to be allowed to refute at last some of Capt. Junck's statements.

Col. Jouanet, President of the Court impatiently shouted, what, again!

This was greeted with an outburst of hissing from the crowd that made Col. Jouanet turn red and adjourned the Court in ten minutes.

HEAVIEST WOMAN DIES.

Mrs. Frank Whitlock, Who Has Just Expired in Michigan, Weighed 640 Pounds.

COLDWATER, Mich., Aug. 18.—Mrs. Frank Whitlock, who died at her home in Batavia Township today, was reputed to be the heaviest woman in the country. Her weight was 640 pounds. Her coffin is forty inches wide and twenty-seven inches deep. Mr. Whitlock was formerly a Chicago policeman.

Tom Butler a National Champion.

Tom Butler won the one-third mile professional championship at the L. A. W. Meet at Boston Wednesday. The field was put into four heats and those qualifying went into the semi-finals. The semi-finals were made interesting, with a Butler in each. In the first one "Tom" Butler and "Major" Taylor loaded in the rear watching each other. Then McCarthy shot out and stirred up the rest. It was a great finish, Taylor getting the heat by half a length, Butler second and McCarthy third. Time 46s. In the other semi-final Frank Butler pedaled for dear life all the time and won in 44-2-5s., with Hammer second and McLeod third. The prettiest fight was in the final, with the two Butlers against Taylor. At the pistol Frank Butler shot ahead, drawing McCarthy and McLeod after him, leaving Taylor watching "Tom." Rather than risk the result Taylor at half the distance spurred. He caught the leader in the stretch, but "Tom" Butler was with him, and the finish was at a terrific clip, the "Major" losing by a few inches. Frank Butler brought up the rear. The time was 42 2-5s.

Pope May Take a Hand.

ROME, August 18.—Pope Leo strongly disapproves of the attitude of French Catholics towards Dreyfus, and it is expected that he will so inform the French hierarchy.

WESTERN FLOODS.

The Saskatchewan Rises Forty Feet in a Day.

EDMONTON Aug. 19.—The River Saskatchewan has overflowed its banks. The water has risen forty feet in the last twenty-four hours and continues to rise. The bridge piers are now four feet under water. The electric light boilers are covered and the Hudson Bay flats submerged. The river is strewn with miners' shacks. Thousands of feet of lumber are adrift. Two and a half inches of rain fell in the last twenty-four hours. Citizens are leaving the river banks. The damage will be great.

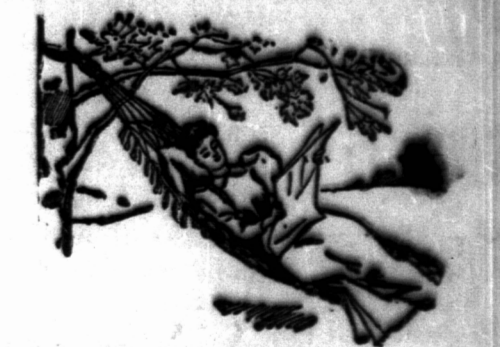
