FRENCH CABINET RESIGNS, RIOTING FEARED

Snowden Collapses In Address

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The condition of Viscount Snowden, who collapsed in the midst of an address today, was described from his home tonight as reassuring. It was stressed he was in no danger.

The frail former Chancellor of the Exchequer, only recently returned to active politics, was deploring various policies of the National Government before the Cobden Club when he suffered the seizure. He cut his speech short and was escorted to his home.

HERRIOT TO SUCCEED DOUMERGUE

PARIS, Nov. 6.—A nine months' political truce in France ended today as Premier Gaston Doumergue's National Government fell, and tonight Paris, recalling the riots that brought "Papa" Doumergue to power, feared new bloodshed.

Edouard Herriot, Vice-Premier, and his five fellow Radical Socialist ministers forced Doumergue out, quitting the cabinet after the Premier had differed with the party over his programme for constitution revision.

The aged leader was expected to present the cabinet's collective resignation to the President Thursday.

Hauptmann's Attorney Lays Charge

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—Bruno Richard Hauptmann's attorney, Lloyd Fisher, today charged the state with subjecting the Lindbergh kidnap suspect to "an inhuman third degree to harass him and break down his mentality."

A grim silent guard of state troopers and deputy sheriffs, fewer than five in number, stand outside Hauptmann's cell night and day, Fisher declared, never speaking to the prisoner or to each other.

When the prisoner asks for something, the attorney said, it is handed to him without words. When the guard is changed there are at least 10 men outside Hauptmann's cell at one time.

"Hauptmann ought not to be subjected to any indignity not imposed on other prisoners held under the same charge," Fisher said, indicating he would ask Attorney General Davis T. Wilentz to remove the troopers as guards.

NEW DEALERS ROLL UP HUGE MAJORITY

Roosevelt "Overjoyed" As Election Returns Indicate Big Victory Over Republicans.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt's new dealers were sweeping the United States on the basis of returns from Congressional elections tonight. The President at Hyde Park was reported to be "overjoyed" as his party's candidates for the Senate led their opponents in 14 states and trailed in seven.

Should this trend be maintained, the Democrats in the new Senate would number 66, more than a two-thirds majority.

The administration forces, claiming a "wonderful victory," were further encouraged by the doubtful battle waged in Pennsylvania where Joseph P. Guffey, backed by Post-Master General James A. Farley, generalissimo of the Democratic campaign, was creeping up on the bitter foe of the new deal, Senator David A. Reed.

"Into Oblivion"

Among the "famous Republican figures" quoting Mr. Farley, who seemed about to "tumble into oblivion" were Senators Simon D. Pess, old guard Conservative in Ohio, Arthur Walcott of Connecticut, Hamilton Keane of New Jersey and Henry D. Hatfield of West Virginia. These were trailing in the count.

Farley insisted the margin of the Democrats in the house, they held 312 seats in 1932, would not be materially reduced. In off year elections the opposition normally gains and should this prediction hold, the event would be considered a Demo-

To Herriot, as leader of the faction that broke the truce, President Albert Lebrun will assign the task of forming another government.

Friends said Herriot would accept. He will keep the Doumergue line-up almost intact, they said, leaving out only Henri Lemery, Minister of Justice, and putting in his place former Premier Andre Tardieu, minister without portfolio under Doumergue, who will serve as vice-premier.

So vivid was the fear of disorders that the retiring Premier and his ministers decided to defer announcement of the government's fall until Thursday, hoping Herriot will have his new cabinet ready by then.

Meanwhile, the most elaborate precautions were taken to avert repetition of the street fighting that preceded the overthrow of Edouard Daladier's government.

Will Continue Naval Parley

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Great Britain and the United States agreed again today that tri-power naval conversations must continue until an agreement is reached, but insisted any concessions must come from Japan.

A meeting between Norman H. Davis, United States delegate, and Sir John Simon, British Foreign Minister and members of Britain's delegation, resulted in reassertion of their opposition to Japanese proposals for new methods of naval limitation.

POTATO MARKETING SCHEME AT SOURIS MEETING APPROVED

A meeting called by the Marketing Board for the purpose of considering the scheme under the National Products Marketing Act in connection with the marketing of potatoes was held in Souris Monday evening. There was a good attendance of representative farmers and dealers present. Col. G. E. Pull and Mr. J. J. Trainor were present representing the Marketing Board.

Mr. Peter Holland was elected chairman of the meeting.

The general principles of the schemes, and the preliminary steps taken to date were outlined by Col. G. E. Pull. Mr. J. J. Trainor, who represented the Provincial Marketing Board at the conference at Ottawa outlined the procedure and submitted the full scheme. The meeting gave careful consideration to the scheme, and a number of the farmers present asked concerning different points and expressed their personal views that efforts should be made to control the marketing of potatoes.

The scheme was unanimously approved by a standing vote. The meeting also confirmed the appointment of Messrs J. Trainor and M. G. McNeely as provisional members of the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board.

Labor Scores Victories In Scotland

EDINBURGH, Nov. 6.—Labor registered an impressive victory today as municipal elections took place in Scotland.

In the busy city of Glasgow the Socialists gained a majority of 14 in the town council. Returns showed that Labor and the Independent Labor party had between them 65 seats. Other seats were apportioned as follows: Moderates 46; Protestant League five.

Elsewhere the Laborites made marked inroads, similar to the results in the headway they made against the Conservative candidates in the municipal elections in England and Wales last week.

In Dundee Labor gained four seats, in Aberdeen three, in Motherwell three. The turnover in Motherwell gave that town its first labor council.

Phillips May Stand Trial Third Time

MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—Possibility of Nelson Phillips, 19, going on trial for the third time for the murder of his 15-year old cousin, Maud Asch, was seen here today with the announcement by Premier L. A. Taschereau he had instructed Quebec Crown prosecutors to lodge an appeal against Phillips acquittal last week. Premier Taschereau is the attorney-general of the province.

The appeal would be based on points of law, the premier pointed out, as the Crown had no right to appeal on facts. Chief ground of the appeal, he stated, would be exclusion from the second trial of alleged statements Phillips made to detectives after his arrest at Gaspé, Que.

DOCTORS IN CONFERENCE LAST EVENING

Discuss Plans To Co-ordinate Medical Association Activities.

Completing a Canada-wide trip, Dr. J. E. MacEachern, Calgary, president of the Canadian Medical Association, and Dr. T. E. Routley, secretary, arrived in Charlottetown last evening and were guests at a dinner tendered in their honor by the Prince Edward Island Medical Association at the Canadian National Hotel.

At present the local medical organizations throughout Canada are separate entities and it is now proposed to make the Canadian Medical Association a central organization with subsidiary organizations in each province. This would make for better co-ordination in the way of providing statistics on various diseases, as well as greater opportunity for research work. Dr. MacEachern discussed this plan in his general outline, while Dr. Routley dealt with particular phases pointing out what the Canadian Association had been doing in the way of providing post-graduate lectures, etc. in supplying health articles in newspapers throughout Canada, and in initiating health legislation. Under the plan proposed, the central organization would have much more authority than it now has in furthering medical work.

Trade Board Members Visit Steamer

A number of members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade went yesterday afternoon to inspect the S. S. "Farnorth", which is on the Montreal, Charlottetown, St. John's run, and to discuss with Captain Murley the feasibility of putting the ship on the Charlottetown, Halifax, Boston run next summer. Captain Murley stated that he would like to go back on that route, as he commanded ships of the Plant Line on that run some years ago.

The "Farnorth" is a splendid ship, 276 feet overall, and has accommodation for about seventy first class passengers, with a total passenger accommodation of about 170. 25 automobiles can also be carried very easily by the ship. Some cars can be put into the hold, but Capt. Murley stated that he has taken cars from Boston to St. John's, Nfld. on the deck without any difficulty.

PRICES BELOW THE COST OF PRODUCTION

TRURO, N. S., Nov. 6.—Potatoes are offering in Prince Edward Island at 10 cents per bushel and in Carleton County, New Brunswick, at 20 cents per barrel, it was claimed at a meeting of potato growers and shippers in Truro last night.

The growers claimed that prices were far below the cost of production. They have 20,000 barrels of market potatoes and they said that the only way the present crop can be sold profitably is by working under the Federal Marketing Board.
