France Leads In Weight Lifting

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 31.—(A.P.)—France possesses the first championships of the tenth Olympic Games. Two of her weightlifters broke 1928 records in the opening programme of competition. Rene Duverger, 21 year old Parisian dancing professor—who specializes in athletic dancing and physical education—won the lightweight contest by hoisting a total of 715 pounds. Louis Hostin of France raised 803 pounds to take the light heavyweight title.

The 1928 lightweight record was 711 pounds. Hans Haas of Austria second place man last night, tied with K. Helbig of Germany at Amsterdam. E. S. Nessel of Egypt won the light heavyweight championship of 1928, bringing 771 pounds from the floor. The light heavies weigh 181 pounds or under and the lightweights 148 pounds and under.

Scout News and Notices

Between 15,000 and 18,000 Boy Scouts are camping this summer in various parts of the Dominion.

HOW MANY SCOUTS IN WALES?

The last Scout census for Wales showed 6,822 Scouts, 153 Sea Scouts, 999 Rovers, 51 Rover Sea Scouts, and 5,504 Wolf Cubs.

CANADIAN UNIFORMS IN FALKLANDS

The uniforms worn by Scouts of the Falkland Islands are procured from Canadian Scout headquarters, Ottawa. Included is a special heavy "wind-breaker."

BOY SCOUTS IN THE HOLY LAND

Since the visit of Jewish Scouts to the world Scout gathering in England in 1928 there has been a steady growth of the movement in the Holy Land. The last census showed a total of 2,371, largely located in Jerusalem.

BRITISH RAILROAD SCOUT SOCIETIES

A Scout Society has been formed by Scout members of the Great Western Railway staff at Paddington, London. Other important divisional points such as Swindon, Bristol, Newport, Birmingham and Swansea are organizing similar societies.

HOW MANY SCOUTS IN IRELAND?

In Northern Ireland 2,602 Boy Scouts, 618 Rovers, 2,306 Wolf Cubs and 515 leaders—a total of 6,051. Free State: 1,025 Scouts, 303 Rovers, 128 Sea Scouts, 26 Rover Sea Scouts, 553 Wolf Cubs, 256 leaders—a total of 2,291.

CAMP GOOD TURNS

In carrying out their daily good turn while in camp Scouts have discovered some novel forms of service. One troop provided an all night guard for a girls' camp near which a suspicious character had been seen. Another troop "shaved an old gentleman." Numerous cars have been pulled from sand and mud holes, and one car was dragged from a lake. Many farmers have been assisted in various ways.

JULY CONTRACTS HOLD AT JUNE LEVEL

Construction contracts awarded during July throughout Canada had an estimated value of \$12,540,100, according to MacLean Building Reports Limited. The seasonal tendency in former years has been for the July total to decrease from June. The past month showed a slight increase.

Over half of the July contracts are shown as having been awarded in Ontario, where 54.2% of the Dominion contracts valued at \$6,792,600 were awarded. Quebec had 27.4% or \$3,443,700. The Prairie Provinces shared to the extent of \$1,023,400 worth or 8.2%, while British Columbia had 5.2%, valued at \$650,700, and the Maritimes, 5% or \$629,700.

Contracts in the Engineering Group for July, amounted to \$4,806,300 which was 38.3% of all contracts. \$4,528,500 is shown for business building the percentage being 36.1%. Residential had 21.4% or \$2,674,900 and industrial 4.2% or \$530,400.

For the first seven months, \$34,182,000 has been Ontario's share in the Dominion contracts. This is

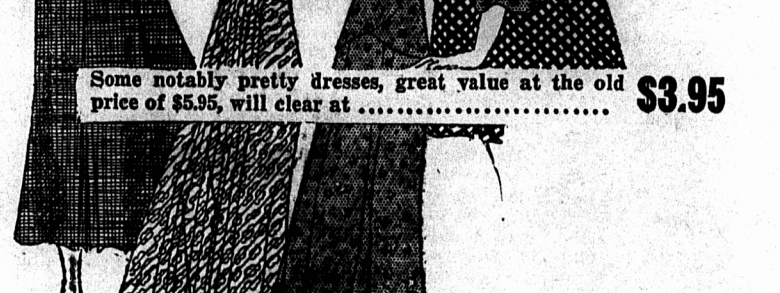

SOURCE OF CANADA'S WOOD-PULP PRODUCTION

OTTAWA, August 1.—Of all the wood-pulp produced in Canada in

1930, according to the figures lately issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, in co-operation with the Forest Service, Department of the Interior, somewhat over 93 per cent was composed of two species, namely, spruce and balsam fir, or balsam. The remainder was made up of hemlock, jack pine, and poplar with a few less important kinds.
