BRITAIN'S TRADE WITH BELGIUM

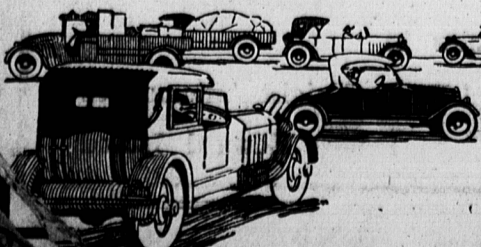
