Sport Echoes from Prince County

Most hockey followers got a big surprise Friday night when the Summerside All-Stars defeated the Borden Nationals by the top-sided score of 7 to 1. Taking both teams' showing against the Charlottetown Navy as a criterion it looked as if the Summerside-Borden series would be a hard-fought struggle.

The local R.Q.A.P. took their best forward and put him in the net against the Dodgers last week and in so doing seemed to strengthen their team. Sometimes such a switch works to advantage, sometimes it does not. It all adds up to plenty of headaches for the coaches who have to decide what is the best thing to do in any given circumstance.

We believe the chief reason for the top-sided score in the game at Borden was that the Summerside team played their best hockey of the year. We never saw them tear up the ice so fast or pass the puck with so much precision as they did against the Nationals on Friday night. Charlie Deignan was back in his 1947 stride and he and his wings, G. Bernard and Trainor, were particularly effective. The other two lines were also clicking with more regularity than they had been doing all winter, and the result of all this was that the Borden team was hit with a pretty devastating attack.

Steele and Grant make up a defence pair that compares favorably with any other blue-line duo on the Island. They were never more effective this year than they were against the Nationals in the first play-off game. Grant came through with a honey of a goal in the first frame. It was almost an exact replica of a goal he had scored against the R. C. A. F. last week. On both occasions he went from the blue-line to the crease with a dazzling display of sleight-of-stick and then jured the net guardian out of his citadel to poke the puck into the empty cage. To state it simply it was a lulu.

And now just when the All-Stars are beginning to hit their stride and show promise of giving even the strong Charlottetown entry a good argument for the Island title, they suddenly find themselves without a home. The Crystal Rink has been denied them for their second game with Borden tonight and they are forced to play the game in Bedeque Rink. The reason given to the All-Star management for not allowing them home ice for this contest is a rather surprising one. The rink authorities say they do not choose to put off the regular Monday night skate for this match. As play-off games have always been given priority over regular skating nights there seems reason to doubt that this is the real reason for the refusal. In any case the All-Stars are powerless to do anything to remedy the situation. The Borden team was not able to play the game on Saturday night as some of its players could not get off from work, and they could not be compelled to do so because Vice-President Lawlor has ordered the game played on Monday night. We feel that Lawlor's order is a reasonable one, because teams should not have to play on consecutive nights if it can be avoided. So the All-Stars are homeless. The fact that they will now have to play all their games away from home may seriously affect their chances to bring credit to themselves and to the Town by winning the Island championship, but we feel sure they will continue to do everything possible to overcome their handicap and fight through to victory.
