At Expense of Consumer

"But now we have reached the stage where the expansion in war production will have to take place very largely at the expense of the consumer," he continued. "We have accomplished much by expanding employment and production, and by diverting our capital producing industries to war purposes. In doing so, we have had to make the consumer go short on a few things—certain luxury imports, foreign exchange for pleasure travel, certain scarce metal goods. In recent months, however, the shortages of particular materials have been getting more and more frequent—the most basic of all scarcities—a shortage of labor—is developing. All these difficulties are going to make themselves felt in a reduced volume of goods available for sale to ordinary consumers."

Noted Opera Singer heard In fine concert

The first concert of the season under auspices of the Community Concert Association was given in St. Paul's parish hall last night by Mr. Leonard Warren, leading baritone of the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York. Famed for his appearance in leading roles in such operas as "Carmen," "Tosca," and "Aida," Mr. Warren's reputation preceded him here, and much was naturally expected of him. Now, when Charlottetown music lovers distinguished in last night's splendid programme.

Mr. Warren opened with two songs from Handel: "Thais" and "Tosca," a magnificent aria from the oratorio "Israel in Egypt," and "O Rudder than the Cherry," from the pastorate "Acis and Galatea." There were followed by two delightful compositions by Torelli and Buxtehude, representative of classical Italian music at its best.

More familiar, and unclassically popular was his next selection—the "Foreword Song" from "Carmen." Mr. Warren's spirited rendition of this favorite was received enthusiastically, as were also the three following selections from "Songs of the Sea" by Sir Charles Villiers Stanford, an eminent Irish musician who was distinguished both as a composer and conductor.

From "Acis and Galatea" (Offenbach) and the opera "Herodiade" (Massenet) Mr. Warren next sang two passionate arias, rendered with fine feeling and style. His closing selections included a traditional 17th century air arranged by William Tarrasch, a musical setting of Tennyson's "O Beauty," "In Beauty," and a song by the well known modern composer, John Ireland.

Several encores were responded to by Mr. Warren, and were equally well received by the audience. They included "Largo Al Factotum" (Barber of Seville), "Widmung" (Franz Liszt), "Meditation" by Leon Cavallo, and "Drink to me only With Thine Eyes."

After assisting as piano accompanist was Mr. Milford Snell, who also gave as solo contributions two Choral Preludes from Bach and Fantasia, Op. 42, by Chopin. His masterly interpretation of these compositions was heard with keen appreciation.
