Thrilling Rescue On High Seas

"A Damned Stiff Bit Of Work", Was Tribute Paid By Capt. Of Sinking Ship, After His Crew Of 28 Were Rescued By Montcalm Sailors.

HALIFAX, N. S., March 13.—A new and thrilling chapter in the rescue at sea was written off this coast on Saturday when the Montcalm liner took 28 men from the heaving deck of the sinking steamer Reindeer 1.

Whether the Reindeer, an abandoned derelict, lay low in the trough of a storming sea, a menace to navigation, or whether she had gone to the bottom was still a matter of conjecture tonight. A note of irony in her fate, for she was bound to assist the disabled Hamburg American steamer Harburg off Sable Island when her teak timbers could withstand no longer the battering of a turbulent sea.

Captain R. Featherstone and his crew were safe at home today through the seamanship of the Montcalm's officers and a boat's crew which put off from the liner, and them aboard as rising water covered the deck. The Reindeer's engine room, and dropped down to leeward to put them safe.

Meanwhile, the Harburg, helpless with a broken rudderpost, was in the hands of the New York tug Willett. The tug, 150 miles south southwest of Chelabuco Head, according to messages received here late yesterday afternoon.

The Reindeer had lain off the coast since Saturday, knocked hither and yon by the sea's whim, but not, apparently, in any imminent danger. The ocean going tug Foundation, which left Halifax on Saturday afternoon, smashed her gear and made temporary repairs and yesterday was reported heading toward the Harburg "at speed." Nothing was heard to date.

"A damned stiff bit of work," was a tribute paid by a superior officer this morning to the job done by second officer H. S. "Boegey" Smith of the Montcalm and his crew, who took off the Reindeer's men.

With the reticence common to British seamen, Captain A. Rothwell, Chief Officer R. T. Sale, First Officer R. Wood and second officer Smith himself were inclined to minimize the importance of the achievement. "Boegey" Knight preferred to talk about music. He is a composer in his spare moments, and his "Paean of Empire" is the latest act music being used by the Colbourne and Barry Jones of the current Canadian tour.

Captain Reginald Featherstone of the Reindeer was strong in his praise of the piece of work done by his crew of eight. Only a good-sized steamer could have

Gustav Winter (Independent)—109,000.

Search Continues For Lindy Baby

HOPEWELL, N. J., Mar. 13.—The New Jersey State Police today announced that their investigation had not disclosed "any definite information of a concrete nature leading to a solution" of the kidnapping of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.
The police statement came after Sheriff Baxter Swicegood at Crossville, Tenn., aroused an anxious public by an announcement that he had detained four persons with a baby answering the description of the kidnapped infant. The Sheriff telephoned direct to Colonel Lindbergh here and Tennessee physicians began an examination of the child. Some discrepancies began to appear in the physical features of the infant held in Tennessee and the known facts about the Lindbergh baby.
Finally late in the day, Col. H. Norman Schwarzgopf, head of the New Jersey State Police, in a formal statement said:
"Certain characteristics and identifying marks of the baby in Tennessee differed from those of the missing child and it was definitely determined that the baby found in Tennessee has no bearing on the Lindbergh case."

Thinks Hoover's Chances Good For Re-Election

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 13.—(By Ken Clark, Canadian Press Correspondent) — Republicans are confident the chances of President Hoover for re-election in November have distinctly improved. Their opinion is shared to some degree by detached observers. There are three reasons:

First—The machinery of the "grand old party" had begun to function. The spell-binders have started to spell bind and with such apparent effect the stalwart Herald-Tribune of New York is able to rejoice in an editorial entitled, "The return of the President."
Second—The Democrats, famous for throwing away elections by battling among themselves, have demonstrated their ability in that direction by permitting the entry of "Al" Smith of New York in the presidential race, obviously for the purpose of defeating Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt for the nomination. Again, the democrats in Congress have been content to pass Mr. Hoover's reconstruction measures without demur and have produced no positive programme of their own.
Third—The general assumption President Hoover must assume the entire responsibility for hard times begins to be dissipated. In fact, as this idea is carefully destroyed by the Republican press and speakers, the knowledge the president has been heartily blamed for everything from droughts to cold coffee, now tends to operate in his favor. The hard-working man in the white house appears to be about to harvest a lot of sympathy.

A feature of the situation sometimes overlooked in Washington where two-party politics is the sole industry, is the abandonment by both parties by a considerable number of voters in times of great economic stress. The dissident vote in November will subtract from the count of both Democrats and Republicans, but the Democratic party used to be Liberal and it will suffer the more.

MONTREAL, Que., March 13.—(By the Canadian Press) —On account of the premium on United States funds and because many Americans, though they will not be able to afford a trip to Europe this summer, will still insist on a bit of foreign travel, Canada's tourist traffic should benefit greatly in the coming season, said Charles M. Black, president of the Royal Automobile Club of Canada in a recent interview. "It rests with Canadians and the type of hospitality which they exhibit to visitors, aided by artificial means this year, will continue and expand," he added.
Speaking of the regrettable type of mentality frequently shown towards the foreign visitor Mr. Black remarked that many people viewed the tourist as a picaresque species of which there was an un-

limited supply. "This outlook," he said, "must definitely be abandoned. Genuine courtesy and hospitality must be the rule and the kind of hospitality should be shown which does not evaporate when the prospect for a sale disappears. It should not all be a matter of dollars and cents."
