Scout News and Notices

A Rover Scout Crew of Ilkley, Yorkshire, joined the Territorial Army as a complete anti-aircraft section of the Royal Engineers.

Methods of rescuing unconscious persons from a burning house were demonstrated by the Scouts of the Stratford, Ont., Baptist Troop, in connection with presentation of a Scout Fireman's Proficiency Badge.

One of the teachers in a Royln school recently urged all the boys of her classes to become Boy Scouts or Wolf Cubs, stating that a good majority of her top-ranking pupils were members either of the Royln Wolf Cub Pack or Boy Scout Troop.

One of the unexpected wartime jobs coming to Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of a rural English town was the unannounced arrival, during the London evacuation, of 70 blind and infirm people. The Scouts and Guides immediately scoured about, collected and filled straw mattresses and bore them to the improvised sleeping quarters. They secured blankets, arranged for food and did everything else possible to make the helpless evacuees comfortable.

Campbellton, N. B. Graphle. There's something in this Boy Scout business more than appears on the surface, even in little ways. The other day an Essex County business man told an interesting little sidelight on Scouts. He inadvertently locked the door of his office, leaving the keys inside. After lunch he found himself locked out, with no one around. Seeing a small boy on the street, he hailed him and asked the boy to open a window, climb through and unlock the door for him. When he walked into his office with a pleased expression on his face he drew a dime from his pocket, and went to hand it to the boy, with a "Thank you," but the boy drew back saying "No, sir, I'm a Scout." This organization will never appeal without response to this man in the future when it makes citizens like that.

At a farewell banquet to Scoutmaster C. P. Kempton of the 1st Moose Jaw Scout Troop it was stated that some 600 boys had passed through the troop under his guidance.

Demonstrations of bandaging for fractures, the carrying of unconscious persons and other first aid work were given by Boy Scouts before the Women's Institute of St. Mary's, Ont.

Prior to the Nazi regime there were several Boy Scout organizations in Germany with the advent of Hitler all were suppressed, and the only youth movement permitted was the Hitler Jugend, the junior branch of the Nazi party, and entirely political and militaristic in character.

His Worship Mayor Ralph Day of Toronto has been made an honorary U. S. Boy Scout. The distinction was conferred upon him by a Troop of Scouts from Cleveland, Ohio, while passing through Toronto after a canoe trip into Northern Ontario. Mayor Day formerly was a Boy Scout of the 21st Toronto Troop.

"The Boy Scouts showed in that bit of work what an effective body for service to the community the Scout movement is," was the comment of Fire Chief Lampman of Welland, Ont., upon the efforts of a bucket brigade of Scouts of the "Stop 19" Troop in attacking a fire in a country cottage. The efforts of the Scouts confined the fire to the dwelling until the arrival of the firemen from Welland.

A move to attract public attention to an old spring of medicinal water, the Spa Well at Logy Bay, Newfoundland, declared by medical men to have greater curative value than the waters of Bath, England, was recently made by Boy Scouts of St. Edward's Nfld. The boys hiked to the well and spent a week-end cleaning up the surroundings. Upon their return they announced that it was now up to the Newfoundland Tourist Bureau to take the matter up, and develop the spring's popularity.

FRANCIS KELLY

A wide circle of friends, not only in Kelly's Cross parish and in Charlottetown as well as in the United States, heard with sincere regret of the death of the late Francis Kelly, October 27th, 1939, in the Charlottetown Hospital. Frank, by which all who knew him addressed and referred to him had been in rather delicate condition of health for the past year or two. His love for work and his strong will power and high degree of courage and grit, deceived not only himself but his immediate relatives as to his real physical state. For only on the previous day (26th) after a visit by Dr. Soper, he was taken by ambulance to the hospital, where he died the next morning at 8 o'clock. Before leaving his home in Maplewood he received the last Sacraments from the hand of his beloved pastor, Rev. Wm. McCabe. The deceased was possessed of a strong faith inherited from his Irish forefathers, an inspiration to do the right thing at the right time a desire to ever better his standing and help those who needed help. He could close his eyes in death with no regrets as to his earthly life. "His word was as good as his bond," and he would look the whole world in the face for he owed not any man."
