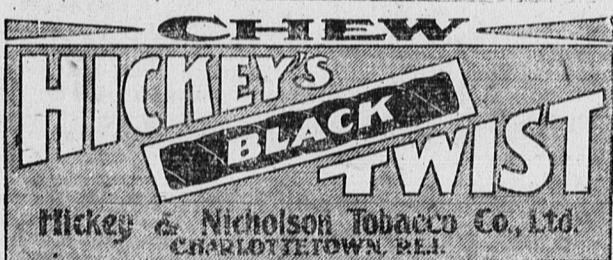

PATRIOTISM PUTS NEW PRICE ON PERSONALITY

TORONTO, Sept. 17.—Personality is paying the way to recovery for scores of crippled Canadians in Toronto today, and the finest and busiest men in the community are lending themselves to the work.

"If you want a thing done ask the man who is busy" has proved true in the experience of the instructors at Hart House where the slow work of re-education with men whose limbs or faculties have been crippled in service overseas is carried on, and the clergy, men of big business, college professors and physicians are found working with the returned men every day.

Work Invaluable

A business man may be capitalizing on crisp humor, the minister a keen sympathy, the college professor his knowledge of young men, and the doctor a technical skill, but they are all pooling their personalities in patriotic service, and securing results which could never be realized if the men were left stranded to work out their own salvation.

Each man takes a certain case for his charge. He is instructed in his needs, and each day at an appointed hour he is on hand when the returned man is brought to Hart House from

the hospital for his treatment, to work with him, at his task.

The volunteer worker is as anxious to set him on his feet as the veteran is to be well, and it is worker's enthusiasm which many times saves the day.

Among these men, whose number in the fall will be augmented by many other college professors, are Prof. S. Beatty, Prof. Holt, Prof. Brown, Rev. R. P. Byers, Dr. James C. Watt and F. C. A. Jeanneret.
