MR. RICHARD HENNEBERY

In the passing of Mr. Richard Hennebery of Morell the community has lost a respected citizen and the Catholic Church a most devoted member. His death took place on August 10th at the advanced age of ninety years and truly it may be said, "a gentleman of the old school has passed on."

Coming to Prince Edward Island over sixty years ago he married Elizabeth Callaghan of Iona, settled in Morell and became one of the most successful farmers of that section. His devotion to the church was shown in many ways. When the little church of St. Lawrence was only a mission he gave freely of his talent teaching, singing to the young boys of the community and helping to form a choir. For years he was a familiar figure on Sunday afternoons on his way to the church where he taught catechism to a class of boys always under the priest in charge. Rev. James McDonald and Rev. Father Gillis of St. Andrews when there was no resident priest at Morell and later under Rev. A. A. McAulay, first parish priest and Rev. A. J. McIntyre his successor.
