RELIGIOUS SERVICES

THE BAPTIST CHURCH

Commencing this morning a series of five sermons on Great Doctrines of the Church, and considering the question "What may we believe about Jesus?" The Rev. Harvey L. Denton, B. D., spoke on "Is Jesus Divine?" Taking as his text the words of St. Matthew 1: 23; "They shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us," the speaker pointed out that many of our highest convictions are not susceptible to mathematical type of proof, but are matters of experience and faith. The Divinity of Jesus is such a matter. Presenting a character utterly unique in person, word, and work, no other hypothesis than divinity can afford an explanation adequate. Unique and different from what he is than by what he does, his personality in its impact upon us convicts us of sin, transforms, illuminates. The New Testament accepted as an authority is convincing in its evidence. Finally, the testimony of experience "in touching Jesus we have touched God. For us, Jesus is "Emmanuel, God with us."

At the evening service Mr. Denton delivered a thought provoking, forward looking sermon on "1938—what hast thou in thine hand?" At the morning service the old English carol "God rest ye merry, gentlemen," was finely sung by the choir. Miss Vera H. Campbell sang Beautiful, the March of Days. The music of the evening included: The Wassail Bough, duet by Misses V. H. M. Campbell and Pearl Burns. New Years Carol "Old Waits."

The Communion of the Lord's Supper was observed at the evening service.

Organ preludes by Miss Callbeck were Choral Preludes on St. Columba, Allegro Moderato and Adagio, Mendelssohn.

ST. DUNSTAN'S BASILICA

On New Years the Feast of Circumcision was observed. Masses were celebrated at the usual hours with Rev. Dr. McMahon delivering the sermons. The High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Flash Bomb For Military Purpose

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—(CP)—A darkness-shattering bomb which operates a camera by means of a photo-electric cell is one of the latest devices being added to the defensive equipment of modern armies.

Dropped from an aeroplane at night the bomb explodes in a few seconds, lighting up the whole countryside and making a picture of it as good as the average daylight picture.

Developed in the United States the photograph bomb has been tested by United States military authorities for use in other countries. Canadian defence officials are familiar with it, as well as with scores of inventions calculated to make modern warfare more and more a matter of chemistry, mechanics and material equipment.
