PLAYED CARDS WHILE CHILDREN BURNED.

ST. BERNARD, Dorchester county, Que., October 2.—Left alone in their homes by their parents who went out to a neighbor's to play cards, the ten children of Alexander and Mrs. Graft, of this place were burned to death at a late hour last night. The travel home was completely destroyed. The fire is believed to have been due to the explosion of a kerosene lamp.

The dead children, the oldest sixteen, and the youngest sixteen months, had no chance to escape. The travelers were startled from their slumber by seeing a bright red section in the sky. Rushing out of the house in which they were visiting they discovered that their house was in flames. They had no opportunity to attempt to rescue any of their children, for the roof fell in while they were dashing towards the burning building. The bodies of all ten of the children were burned to a crisp.

CANADIAN GRAIN MAY GO BY DULUTH.

OTTAWA, October 2.—At instance of the department of trade and commerce, the Canadian Pacific Railway has made application to the American inter-state commerce commission for the same rates on export wheat shipped from Western Canada points to Duluth as from the same points to Fort William and Port Arthur. Correspondence is in progress with the Canadian Northern and their application will likely follow immediately.

The department hoped that the grain could be all handled thru Canadian channels, but for fear of a repetition of last year's blockade, it was decided, in view of the lateness of the harvest operation, to make arrangements for shipment by Duluth if necessary.

With the completion of the National Transcontinental thru to Cochrane by November 1st, and the enormous increase in the rolling stocks of the western rail, it is not believed that shipping much grain south this year, but the department is arranging itself against any emergency.

The arrangements made by the minister of finance some weeks ago for paying the loan maturing October 1st, in England, have been carried out thru the financial agents of the government. The loan was for \$6,142,220.01 at 4 per cent and was issued in December, 1907, to cover the balance of an old loan dating back to 1878 and guaranteed by the imperial government.

NO ORDER IN COUNCIL AUTHORIZING NEW ISSUE OF C. P. R. STOCK.

OTTAWA, October 2.—Upon inquiry at the department of finance this afternoon, it was ascertained that the government has passed no order in council and has given no authority for the increase in the capital stock of the Canadian Pacific railway. It appears that the company's legal advisers maintain that under legislation passed a few years ago the company has authority to issue new stock up to a certain amount without any further authority from the government. It is under this statute that the issue was sanctioned by the directors today. Upon inquiry of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, it was ascertained that he gave no such intimation to the press as that which has appeared in the evening papers. The above information obtained from the department of finance has been confirmed by inquiry from the prime minister.

RELATIONS WITH WEST INDIES.

OTTAWA, October 2.—Another step in promoting closer relations between Canada and the West Indies is about to be taken. The program decided upon at the conference held here last winter was three fold:—A mutual trade preference, improved steamship communication, and improved cable communication.

The first of these have been effected; the West Indies colonies concerned have ratified the agreement, and the Canadian parliament as soon as it assembles.

The second item on the program is about to be realized, the tenders for a steamer service being now under consideration. These tenders were to be in on October 1st, and it is understood they number three. Final negotiations are now in progress in England relating to cable connection, it being hoped at once to improve the existing service from the standpoint of convenience and efficiency and greatly to cheapen the price of communication.

WOMEN HELD FOR GAMBLING.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Five of the women arrested when detectives smashed their way into a hairdresser's establishment, alleged to have been used as a gambling house, in Second avenue, near First street, were held in \$1,000 bail in the Essex Market Police Court, charged with being "common gamblers." The other two women were freed.

Scores of people crowded into the courtroom and a score of men offering to furnish bail for the women who were held. Magistrate Preschi set the examination in the cases for Monday.

OPEN SUFFRAGETTE CAMPAIGN.

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—Miss Barbara Wylie, militant suffragette, opened her active campaign in Canada yesterday afternoon, when she addressed half a hundred leading ladies of Montreal society. Miss Wylie urged more vigor in the campaign for votes for women in Canada.

SENATOR ELLIS ATTENDS MASONIC GATHERING IN BOSTON.

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 3.—Governor Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, the Democratic candidate for vice-president, shook hands with President Taft last night just before the banquet of the supreme council Scottish Rite Masons, at which both were guests.

President Taft joined with Governor Marshall for a few moments on the war and tear of champagne, and then both passed into the banquet hall where they stood side by side in the receiving line, and shook hands with the diners.

ACCUSE MOTHER AND DAUGHTERS.

TORONTO, Oct. 3.—Following the arrest of Mrs. Louisa Fifield for shoplifting in Eaton's by Acting Detective Wickett, the woman's home was searched. Wickett and Plainclothesman Hess found over 183 articles, said to have been stolen by Mrs. Fifield and her daughters, Ivy and Gwenie. When searched after her arrest the police found six blouses and an umbrella in the mother's possession.

Ivy, aged 15, is alleged to have stolen 11 neck scarfs, 107 neckties, 4 spoons of silk and a spoon of brass wire. The family have been out from the old country nine months.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN UPROAR.

SYRACUSE, Oct. 2.—The Democratic State Convention was thrown into an uproar late this afternoon by an attack upon Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany leader, directed by Thomas M. Osborne, of Auburn, who had been identified with the efforts to unseat Mr. Murphy and his friends, from their positions of prominence, in the party in New York State.

McGRAW SIZES UP THE RED SOX.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Manager McGraw, of the New York Giants, went over to Washington yesterday to size up the Boston Red Sox. With these teams due to begin the world's series struggle here just a week hence, the Napoleonic McGraw took one of the earliest opportunities offered since his team clinched the pennant to study the opinions of "He was expected to pay particular attention to the tactics of Jake Stahl, the Boston leader, with whom McGraw matches managerial wits in the big game. He had no opportunity however to study the pitching of Joe Wood, for Stahl put Bedient, one of his second string men, into the box.

During McGraw's absence Marquard and Tesreau, two of the star pitchers who are being groomed for the world series, went down to defeat by Philadelphia. It was a shock to the ardent fans to see a second division team bunch hits in three innings and finish with a score of 9 to 2 against their favorites for the world honors. Marquard had to be taken out in the fifth and Big Jeff Terrace did even worse work, allowing seven hits and giving four bases on balls. It was too cold a day for good play. Before leaving McGraw reiterated his confidence of the triumph in the world series. Our experience of last year will help us greatly, he said. Go back over the records, and I think you will find that in every case where the same team has played in the world series in consecutive years it was a stronger aggregation the second time than it was the first.
