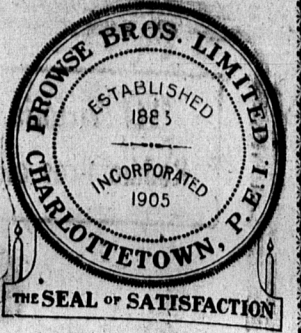

—A RECEPTION to returned soldiers was held in the hall at Port Hill on the evening of April 28th. The soldiers on the platform were Sergt. Arthur Yeo, Northam, Sprs. Stanley Dennis, Erwin Dougherty, Angus McLennan and Earl Maynard, of the Canadian Navy who did duty at Halifax and Sydney. Rev. Roland Davison was chairman of the meeting and a nice program of singing was carried out. Addresses were given by Rev. John J. Bamford, Messrs. W. J. Montgomery, Arch. Montgomery, H. B. S. Birch, Hector Dobie, Cyril Dobie and the chairman. The returned heroes were then called upon and all responded Spr. McLennan giving a good and lengthy account of his trip across the seas and of some of his experiences at the front. After the program had been concluded all present partook of refreshments furnished by the good ladies of Port Hill and vicinity.—P.

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION

A large number of the residents of New Perth and vicinity assembled at the residence of Mr. R. G. McLaren on the night of April 28th to do honor to our returned heroes. Mr. William Cain was called to the chair and after a suitable address called on Mr. J. A. Dewar, M. L. A. who read the following address, after which Mr. J. A. Gordon presented to each soldier a beautiful signet ring the gift of the New Perth Red Cross Society.

"To Sergeant Milton Myers, Ptes. Russel Campbell, J. M. McPhee and Gordon McLaren. We, your friends and neighbors in New Perth and vicinity wish to take this opportunity of tendering you a hearty welcome to this your former

homeland from the tragic and awful scenes enacted on the battlefield in France and Flanders, a conflict in which you have so signally distinguished yourselves in common with other brave Canadians who have battled with great fortitude and steadfastness for the right side by side with the gallant troops of the other allied nations who had the proud satisfaction to find their efforts ultimately crowned with success and victory over the proud legions of Germany who were forced to most humiliating surrender, ever known in history. That the aspirations for world domination by the war lords and Junkers of Prussia were nipped in the bud is due in no small measure to the dashing gallantry of Canada's devoted sons who had the honor on many occasions to stand the brunt of the attacks. Such names as Ypres, Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele, Arras, Amiens and Cambrai will be inseparably associated with their dashing exploits and will shed a lustre on our memory and as they have sacrificed and suffered so also the memory of their heroic deeds will be cherished by those now living as well as by the generations yet unborn and while we sorrow for the noble dead who sleep, row on row, where the poppies grow in Flanders field we are proud to know you have taken up the torch they threw to you. We are grateful to know that you have all recovered from the scars received in battle and are now taking your part again in civilian life. We trust that you will make our Island Province your future abode and we ask you to accept these tokens which show the respect and esteem of the ladies of the Red Cross Society of New Perth; which we also extend to Pte. Leslie McDonald whom we expect soon to be back again with us.

PRaise FOR Y. M. C. A.

(1) The Toronto Globe of Monday, April 28th, makes the following Editorial comment:—"With the work of the Y.M.C.A. most people are familiar. It has stood the test of sharp criticism because it has never had anything to fear. It

is in a very special way assisting in the work of demobilization as it aided in the war during active hostilities. To every returned soldier the Y.M.C.A. offers six months of free membership with all the privileges which a paying member would be entitled to."

(2) The work of the Young Men's Christian Association overseas has been a subject of eulogy by officers and privates alike and by civilians as well as army men, but during the war the Y.M.C.A. did not cease its activities at home. Its entire equipment in the Canadian Associations, especially baths, gymnasiums, reading and writing rooms and concert halls have been at the service of enlisted men from the outbreak of the war. The signing of the armistice meant more, not less work for the "most people are familiar. It has stood activities to meet the changed conditions. It had to deal with problems of demobilization. It is dealing today with the great problems of repatriation. It is out to help not only the returned soldier, but the returned soldier's boy.

(3) A letter from a returned man at Alberton, Prince Edward Island, March 20th, 1919 is as follows:—

"I wish to thank you very sincerely for the free membership ticket to the Y. M. C. A. I may say that the Y. M. C. A. is the very best institution for the social and moral welfare of the young people. While we were overseas the Y. M. C. A. was our best backing. Many lonely hours would have been spent had it not been for the concerts and entertainments furnished by the Red Triangle. 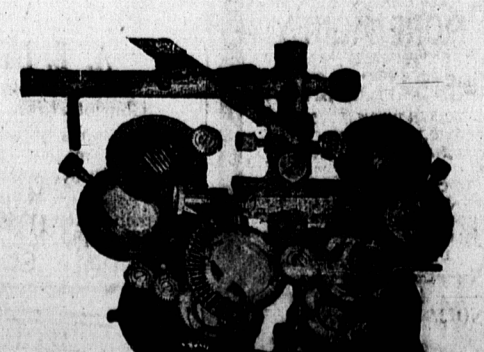
He leaves to mourn his irreparable
