though solid pack peaches haven't sugar in them, a can of fruit packed in this way contains more fruit than that packed in syrup. Besides, as peaches are relatively sweet they require little sugar. In addition this fruit in most cases is selling below ceiling prices and hence is an excellent buy.

And here is a decorative wash salad, ideal for that club luncheon you're planning:
Ingredients: three whole canned peaches; lettuce leaves; one-half pound stoned dates; one-quarter pound chopped nut-meats; one small bottle maraschino cherries.

Cut a peach in half, remove the stone, and put on lettuce leaves with the cut side up. Mix the nut-meats, dates, and cherries with the cherry juice to make a stiff paste. Form into balls the size and shape of a peach stone and fill the centres of the canned peaches. Top with mayonnaise. Serves six.

Now that tomatoes are becoming cheaper and more plentiful, why not try a tomato and cucumber salad?

Ingredients: one large head of lettuce, four medium-sized tomatoes, one cucumber, two table-spoons minced green pepper, French dressing.

Wash the lettuce and separate the leaves without tearing. Set in a cool place to drain and crisp, then arrange stem end down on a large plate. Slice tomatoes and cucumbers and arrange inside the lettuce leaves. Scatter minced green pepper over all. Serve with mayonnaise. Serves eight.
