The shadow of death has again darkened the home of Malcolm Nicholson of Hopedale, and this time it is with a loving wife and mother the husband and children bid farewell. Mrs. Nicholson had been ill for a little over a week of pneumonia when she passed to that realm where none of the inhabitants say "I am sick." She leaves to mourn three sons and two daughters. When he creeps stealthily and noiselessly into the busy world and steals an unsuspecting victim, in the flower and vigor of manhood, whose life is bright with brilliant hopes and future accomplishments, it is then that he crushes the bravest soul and wrings tears from the strongest spirit. Such was the lot of Adams and Mrs. Reynolds of Gaspereaux, when the sad tidings were conveyed to the aged son, A. Wood, who had been killed by an express train on his way to Vancouver, B. C. Attracted by the lure of the West the deceased set out from St. John intending to reside permanently in the land of the setting sun, but the heavenly powers intervened and instead of reaching the desired goal his body came back a corpse to his grief-stricken parents in Gaspereaux. The young man possessed a mild and amiable disposition which instantly won him the friendship of all with whom he came in contact. His sad and untimely demise has cast a dark shadow of gloom over the community in which he was a general favorite. He will be mourned by all who were fortunate enough to have an acquaintance with him, and perhaps most of all by his dear old school-boy chums. Upwards of one hundred carriages followed his remains to his last long home in the beautiful cemetery of Murray Harbor North. He was laid to rest amid the sobs of women and the unrestrained tears of men and a bright young life came to its close.—Com.
