—DOMESTICATED EEL.—Domestication of wild animals is becoming part of the Prince Edward Island air. At O'Leary, the other day, a representative of The Guardian was shown a domesticated eel, one so thoroughly domesticated that it will come to its meals at a given signal and eat out of its keeper's hand. The eel was captured, as a way, last October, placed in a glass tank filled with water, and supplied with pebbles and snails to afford a suitable hiding place. It has grown to a length of about six inches and appears to be thoroughly at home. McDonald offered a tribute of praise to the memory of that benefactress of the redmen. He praised the action of Chief Justice Sullivan and the other trustees in the building of the hall and the contributing toward the purchase of the bands. It is the only thing done for the Indians out of an estate which was bequeathed to them over forty years ago. But neither the rapacity of the pale face, the neglect of executors, the acumen of the legal fraternity nor the astuteness of politicians, could detract from the nobility of the sweet charity which inspired benevolent intention.
