Charges Greece Is Trying To Provoke War

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 16 (AP)—Albania charged today that the Royalist-dominated Greek Government was "trying to provoke war against its neighbors" and demanded that the United Nations Security Council send a commission to Greece itself, "in order to investigate on the spot the situation brought about by the present rulers of Greece."

Replying to Greek charges that Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria were fomenting the current strife in northern Greece, Hyani Kopo, Albanian counter-charge, "what we have here is the uprising of the Greek people against their government. What we have here is a civil war."

Speaking for Bulgaria, Vladimir Stoycheff, Bulgarian political representative in the United States, protested that his country had been subjected to "alandrous attacks" in the Greek press ever since a so-called conference. He called the Greek charges "inert and trivial and unfounded," and said he would offer a list of border incidents created by the Greeks if he was allowed later to participate in the debate.

Both Bulgaria and Albania, neither members of the United Nations, were present thus far only to make statements to rebut the charges presented Thursday by Greek Premier Constantin Tsaldaris.

Like Yugoslavia, Albania blamed the Greek Government for the strife in Greece and asked a U. N. investigation of conditions inside that country.

TRANSFORM DREARY ROOMS WITH WALLPAPER TRICKS.
Colourful new wallpaper, freed by smart decorators from its one sole commitment to walls, is enlarging its repertoire to include coverings its repertoire to include coverings for rugless floors, furniture pick-ups and distinctive linings for cabinets.
Able to dramatize an entire room if used to line bookcases or corners that house what-nots, china and crystal collections are Chinese Chippendale papers splashed with red and gold and other patterns which simulate well-designed mirrors.
To line a cabinet or bookcase, measure sides, back and shelves to determine the yardage required, then armed with the rolls needed, cut paper to fit. Place strips so that pattern motifs jibe correctly and glue down with regular wallpaper paste. For a final eye-catching touch, you can line cabinet drawers to match.
Take that room which needs all-out refurbishing from the bed to the wastepaper basket. What will do the trick with little strain on a budget are motifs cut from hot-patterned paper, decal-fashion, and used as professional decorators do to smarten up tables, head-boards, lampshades, et al. A room that has been freshly repapered with a floral pattern can go rugless indefinitely if matching cut-out motifs are clustered to simulate scatter rugs, garlands or are casually strewn on the floor.
Cut-outs will cling like the proverbial paper on the wall to painted, varnished or enameled-covered floors if the surface gloss is covered with steel wool before the motif is pasted down.
The trick of application is to smooth the paper cut-out lightly, affix it, to force out all air bubbles, weight down the decoration until paste dries, and then apply a coat of wallpaper sizing, which helps to seal it to the floor.
To make your paper motif resistant to wear and tear, put at least two coats of clear varnish over the design, letting the first one dry before applying the second.
Sheets of wallpaper designed to masquerade as marble or wood will aid the camouflage of battered old tables. To convert a scarred refugee from the attic into an expensive-looking "marble" topped table,

Days of Easy Living Over In United Kingdom

For the people of the United Kingdom—even the wealthiest—the days of "easy living" are over. Gone for good is the era of huge houses with plenty of servants. The manpower situation is going to be so tight that, as one of the government's highest officers admitted, "the country cannot afford to have a great number of workers in unproductive occupations."

For labor this is a highly satisfactory development since one of its aims is a leveling out of incomes so that no one will be extremely rich or extremely poor. But the same thing probably would have occurred regardless of what administrative was in power.

All parties are pledged to a wide extension of social legislation and steps to raise the standard of living.

The government's aim is that prosperity for the United Kingdom will mean an end to the pre-war labor struggle, even if the planned modernization of the country's industry brings a higher output from each man's work.

With that the other parties agree. To meet the problem, the government is launching a campaign to improve wages and conditions in the industry most necessary to the national well-being—and domestic service, except for invalids and in large families, is not one of them.

The trend already is evident. It is almost impossible to find a "sitter" to look after children in an evening, let alone find a full-time cook or maid and the pay for domestic service, except for invalids and in large families, is not one of them.

The reduction is likely to spread to other forms of employment. The number of clerks in shops is likely to be reduced if the move is feasible. Delivery of purchases may be curtailed and perhaps there will be fewer porters at railway stations and fewer waiters and waitresses in restaurants.

Toronto Pair Remanded On Burglary Charge

TORONTO, Dec. 16 (CP)—Aftermath of a \$72,200 robbery attempt in which Henry Petersen was shot to death by police, Gerald Gouliby and Hubert Chappell of Toronto today were remanded until Dec. 23 on charges of breaking and entering. Ball was set at \$10,000 for Gouliby but Chappell was refused bail.

"Chappell has recently been released from penitentiary and there are other matters pending which affect him," said Crown Attorney J. W. McFadden. He did not elaborate.

Petersen was killed when trapped with Gouliby and Chappell in a darkened downtown garage Saturday night. Constables said they opened fire after being told "don't come closer or we'll kill you."

They found Petersen after the lights went on dyme from a building in his heart. The 23-year-old criminal died before reaching hospital, his pockets stuffed with a small fortune in bonds.

Police said Chappell had some connection with members of "Toronto's Polka Dot" gang which carried out a number of Ontario and Quebec crimes some time ago. Kenneth Green and George Constantine convicted members of the gang are in Don Jail facing long penitentiary terms. They have appeal.
