## Victoria Unions Advance To Finals

### Ego Replaces Golden Miller As Favorite In Running Of Grand National Today

AINTREE, March 18—(CP)—In an unexpected shift of the betting odds, Sir David Llewellyn's Ego tonight supplanted the great Golden Miller as the favorite to win the centenary running of the Grand National steeplechase.

While the vanguard of a crowd of a predicted 500,000 packed this little racing centre and nearby Liverpool for tomorrow's jumping classic, the final callover at the Victoria Club in London quoted Ego at 8 to 1.

The Miller, winner three years ago in Dorothy Paget's silks, fell back to second place and was coupled with Robert Lehman's American-owned Didoric at 100 to 1. H. Lloyd Thomas' Royal Mail, favorite until replaced a few days ago by Golden Miller, was held at 13 to 1.

Ego finished second to Reynolds last year and is considered one of the surest footed jumpers among the 33 scheduled starters. That is an important factor, for if today's miserable weather can be taken as any indication, the horses will be called upon to slip and slide around 4-1-2 miles of the most treacherous jumping country ever devised by any mortal—with very few of them due to finish.

The King and Queen, who will attend the race, were greeted by the Earl of Derby and his son, Lord Stanley, when the royal train arrived at Huyton station late today.

### Canucks Lose Close Game To Leafs 2-1

MONTREAL, March 18—(CP)—A penalty to Walter Buswell enabled Toronto Maple Leafs to score a late third period goal tonight and take a 2-1 victory over Montreal Canadiens, newly crowned champions of the N. H. L. Canadian section.

The teams had played through all but four minutes of the game, before 4,000 fans, when Buswell went off for spilling Hay Day. Four Leafs forwards went on the attack and on the second faceoff, Jack Shill slapped a pass to Gord Drillon, young rookie from Moncton.

Drillon back-handed a rising shot high into the net before goaler Wilf Cude could move.

Canadiens had come from behind to tie the score in the second period on Red Lorrain's goal, made at the eight minute mark with the help of George Brown. Syl Apps scoring a goal that gave him undisputed possession of the league scoring race, shot Leafs ahead on Day's pass at 11:04 of the first period.

### Five Red Wings Selected For Posts On National League All Star Team

TORONTO, March 18—Great splashes of crimson marked an entirely new all-star hockey picture today. The predominant figures of a year ago—Charlie Conacher and Eddie Shore and Tiny Thompson—were missing. Detroit Red Wings, world champions, were everywhere in the scene.

Five of seven places on the National League's first all-star team, selected by hockey writers for the Canadian Press, were won by Red Wings, not one of whom had ever been voted to such society before.

The five-man front achieved by the Stanley Cup champions was unique in the seven-year history of the poll.

Following are the Canadian Press teams:

**First Team:** Goal, Smith (Detroit); defence, Goodfellow (Detroit); Siebert (Canadiens); centre, Barry (Detroit); right wing, Aurie (Detroit); left wing, Jackson (Toronto); coach, Adams (Detroit).

**Alternate Team:** Goal, Cude (Canadiens); r. defence, Siebert (Chicago); l. defence, L. Conacher (Maroons); centre, Chapman (Americans); right wing, Dillon (Rangers); left wing, Schriener (Americans); coach, Hart (Canadiens).

Except for goal, where sophomore Normie Smith of Detroit edged out Wilf Cude of Canadiens and Thompson of Boston, the voting was decisive right down to the coach, Jack Adams winning by a narrow majority over Cecil Hart kept his champions on top of the American section. Hart, returning to guide the Habitués who had fallen on evil days, lifted the Plysion for the crimson fliers—Red Wings and Canadiens. Adams has of Canadiens.

Up to now, this has been a searing Frenchmen to first place in the Canadian section.

It has been a season, too, for the red-clad stars—rugged Babe Siebert of Canadiens; Larry Aurie, Marty Barry, Ebbie Goodfellow and Smith of Detroit. Toronto's Harvey Jackson, making a fine comeback to gain first-team recognition for the fourth time in six years, was the only other to crowd in.

Sole survivor of the 1936 all-stars was Siebert, an even greater defenceman with Canadiens than he was with Boston last year.

Goodfellow, finishing his eighth season in the National League, held a safe margin over Earl Siebert of Chicago Black Hawks. The fourth defence spot went to Lionel Conacher of Montreal Maroons, 35 years old and the backbone of a powerful rearguard.

Selectors found it easy to put the Aurie-Barry-Jackson line on the first team and not much harder to post Cecil Dillon of New York Rangers, Art Chapman of New York Americans and Sweeney Schriener of Americans on the second team. Dillon had the closest call in beating out Jimmy Ward of Maroons, Dit Clapper of Boston and Johnny Gagnon of Canadiens.

**Gehrig Signs For \$36,000**

NEW YORK, March 18—Lou Gehrig quit his holdout hangout in New Rochelle, N. Y., today and left in the rain for St. Petersburg, Fla., to join New York Yankees.

"Joe McCarthy called me from Florida this morning and convinced me there wasn't a chance of getting more than \$36,000 so I agreed to sign for that and be done with it," said Gehrig.

Weighing 215 pounds and full of the spirit of compromise, the slugging first baseman claims he "would have stood in bed" rather than play for \$31,000, his 1936 salary.

"Until two weeks ago Colonel Ruppert insisted he would not pay me a cent more than he did last year. I thought that was unfair in view of the record last year and I had stayed right here in New Rochelle until October if he hadn't offered more," said Lou.

The teams, occupants of the cellar berths in the Canadian and United States divisions, put on a loosely-played match which not only provided the most goals of any game of the season but also saw another record broken when Dave Schriener and Nels Stewart of the winners and Paul Thompson of the Hawks, performed the "hat-trick". Schriener's three goals placed him within a point of the league's scoring leadership.

Pete Leswick, an Amerk rookie from New Haven of the International-American circuit, Joe Jerwa and Eddie Wiseman were other goal-getters for the New Yorkers. Pep Kelly notched the fourth Chicago counter.

Almost 500 fans jammed the Victoria rink to see the fast-skating locals outplay the Nova Scotians. Played on a fast sheet of ice, as compared with the first game when players stood in water up to their thighs, Victoria had little difficulty in getting past the Pictou defence.

Dan MacLeod, with four goals and one assist, was a standout for the winning team. Although neither figured prominently in the scoring column, Wisner and Lawlor led many dangerous rushes on the Victoria citadel but goalie Lord was in top form last night.

Unions opened the scoring after 10 minutes of play in the first period when J. Knox tallied on a pass from Miller. Lewis MacLeod took Dan MacLeod's pass at the three minute mark of the middle session for another Victoria goal while Dan scored again a minute later.
