The cheese board meets in the city building on Friday at 12 o'clock sharp. Schooner Daisy arrived yesterday with Acadia Round Coal for A. Pickard & Co.

A summons charging an infraction of the Prohibition Act has been served on Andrew Doyle.

Tea parties were held yesterday at St. Teresa and Coleman. Fifty people left the city for the former place.

There will be a meeting in the Salvation Army this evening led by Brigadier Sharp, Adj. Dowell and Adj. Wiggins.

Mr. Ludlow Jenkins of Mt. Albion left yesterday morning for Summerside where he will start the new cheese factory at that place.

The government hatchery at Cariboo, Pictou Co., has put this season along the coast of the province of New Brunswick and P. E. Island, 100,000,000 lobster.

On account of the short pasturage several of the smaller cheese factories in the west are contemplating closing down for the season. This will show the necessity of growing fodder.

Mr. Archibald Irwin the publisher of the P. E. Island Magazine has issued an improved blotter. It is certainly better than the old fashioned style and is unique in every particular.

The new flag station at Milton is nearing completion and is certainly an improvement on the old one which has been moved back to permit of the construction of the new one.

Alderman A. W. McRae, St. John, P. E. C. R. of the High Court of New Brunswick came to the city last night to attend the meeting of the High Court of Foresters which opens this morning at 11 a. m.

YESTERDAY morning at 11 o'clock a fire which had been burning in a swamp on Messrs. Long Bros. farm near St. Dunstan's College, ignited a stack of hay and in a few moments the five tons which it contained were destroyed.

The Steamer Heotra arrived in port at 7 o'clock yesterday evening having on board some 20 passengers, a number of whom were delegates to the session of the High Court which meets to-day at 11. Her cargo consisted in part of over 200 boxes of cheese, 100 cases egg and a quantity of dried codfish.

St. Mark's Sunday School held their annual picnic at Mt. Pleasant on Monday and a very pleasant time was enjoyed. Prizes of various kinds were distributed to the children. Mr. Jas. Howard the superintendent and the teachers did all in their power to make the young folks happy. Mr. Winfield distributed the prizes.

CONSIDERABLE difficulty has been experienced by farmers with forest fires. In the western part of the province fences have been torn down to prevent the spreading of the flames. A passenger who came to the city by the train from the west yesterday states that a day or two ago he assisted a farmer in the saving of his stacks, the fences having conveyed the flames for a considerable distance toward the hay.

The Grand Lodge of Oddfellows in the Maritime provinces meets in Moncton on the 13th, 14th, 15th, and a large number of devotees of the three links are expected to be present. Representative men will be present from all the towns and cities of the Maritime Provinces and local Oddfellows are making every preparation to give the visitors a pleasant time.
