The Commodore's sire, Admiral Dewey, enjoys the rare distinction of having the fastest combined speed inheritance of any stallion that has yet been foaled. His sire Biogen, 2.04, raced successfully at 2, 3, 5 and 6 years of age. At 3 years he lowered his record to 2.12 in a five heat victory against aged horses. At 5 years he won the fastest 5 heat race up to that time, trotting to a record of 2.03, the fastest mile of the year. Admiral Dewey has a close inheritance of the four greatest fountain heads of extreme speed, viz: Electioneer, George Wilkes, (a double cross through Biogen's dam), Happy Medium and Dictator, all sons of Hambletonian 10. His sire is the fastest stallion combining the blood of Electioneer and Wilkes and his dam the fastest mare with the dual inheritance of Happy Medium and Dictator. The career of Nancy Hanks, (the Admiral's dam) is even more brilliant. She won at 3 years, seven races, all of her starts; at 4 years she won six races, again making a clean sweep. Next year she placed Belle Hamlin, Margaret S. and Alorton, placing the world's record at 2.04, which has since been surpassed by 2 mares only, Alex 2.03 and Lou Dillon 1.98. In other races she lost but one heat. She combines the blood of Happy Medium and Dictator, two champion strains. Great as Nancy Hanks was on the turf, she is more renowned as a brood mare. Of her 5 colts three have got records below 2.15. Palma, a yearling son of Admiral Dewey, sold last year for \$2,000. Lady Rithyan, the dam of Commodore Ledyard, was a very fast colt trotter with the ability to trot better than 2.13. As a three year old she started at Reville in a field of 17 aged horses and was second in 2.13. Her sire Jackdaw is the sire of Maxine, 2.03 (champion trotting filly of 1902), Memnon 2.14, King Jackie 2.14, Julia Arthur 2.20, Homeline 2.21, Lady Rithyan 2.21 and 11 others with records below 2.30. Commodore Ledyard will be in June. He is a horse of commanding presence, dappled bay in color, upheaded and very stylish. 12 hands and weighs 1050 lbs. A few weeks after being broken to harness he trotted a mile at Reville in 2:32 quarters in 22 seconds. If you want to breed record breakers, breed to the blood that has produced Kings and Queens. Commodore Ledyard has that blood in his veins. Will stand for the season of 1905 at his stable, opposite the Opera House, Charlottetown. For terms and particulars, apply to MICHAEL A. ROBERT MITCHELL FLOYD, MRS. FLOYD AND DEWEY.
The serious look on the face of Mr. Floyd is caused by Dewey putting ten claws into one of his kees just as the photographer said ready.

The following sketch of Robert Mitchell and Mrs. Floyd, who intend arriving in this city about June first to spend three or four months, will no doubt be read with interest.
Within the last year or two the conscientious active work that has been done by Robert Mitchell Floyd in championing the cause of the trade press of the world has brought him honors and recognition in every conceivable way and to-day his Trade Press List is the recognized organ of that class of journalism that for so long was not equitably recognized by the general press. The work that has been done by editor Floyd is far reaching, echoes of it coming from the Orient, the Indies, the Latin countries, Europe and the vast United States.

It is generally admitted that early conditions have a very strong if not a lasting effect upon the character and mental attributes of individuals and in the case of Robert Mitchell Floyd it is unusually marked. Born in New Orleans in 1849 and living there until the age of nine, the suave and gracious way of the Southerner became an intimate part of his make-up. The change to the North and the thorough public school training followed by the higher branches of the New York Free Academy and the Vermont Episcopal Institute at Burlington awakened in him the sterner qualities. His business experience in New York City, which began at an early period of his life, was acquired in the wholesale grocery and flour-milling interests, and brought him into active contact with the vital questions in regard to food products, which added to his subsequent researches have made him a recognized authority on the Pure Food question. As early as the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia, his connection with it brought him in daily association with the food authorities from all over the world. He was appointed a special delegate to the Tennessee Exposition and was the chairman of the New Jersey Commission to the Omaha Exposition. From 1870 to '88 active mercantile pursuits held Mr. Floyd as a resident in New York, Boston, Chicago and Philadelphia, he then traveled in Europe and returned to his Boston home in 1888. This varied experience, in addition to his many years of intimate personal association with the trade and technical press, fitted him to become the editor and publisher of the Trade Press List.

The reason of this paper's inception was his knowledge of the lack of harmony and acquaintanceship between the editors of the food trade publications of the world and it was his purpose to attempt to foster a more kindly and intelligent spirit between the members of the craft, manufacturers and the wholesale and retail distributor.
A year or two later the Trade Press List added to its columns the many other branches of trade, technical, scientific, and class journalism of every known business section of the globe. This paper circulates in every country where manufacturing interests exist and trade papers are published. It is the only publication of its kind in existence, being published for and in the interests of the trade paper people and carrying an authentic and correct listing of these trade papers, together with editorial comment and criticism. His continuous work on all of these lines have made it possible for the Trade Press to grow into personal touch and thus foster the work lately undertaken by the Trade Press Associations now being formed in different trade centers of the United States. Mr. Floyd's erect carriage, soldierly bearing, pleasant personality and readiness of speech makes him a most welcome guest or platform speaker everywhere, while his intelligence as a writer with his clear incisiveness of expression, finds him space for his articles in the general as well as the trade press. Mr. Floyd is fifty-five years of age and while a resident of New York served for eight years in the New York Seventh. His wife, who is the daughter of the late Peter Henderson, New York City, is a woman of rare attainments and ability and a most clever and acceptable writer of fiction. In 1880, he was delegated to represent the National Grocers Association of the United States at the great world's conference of grocers held in London. He was treasurer of the National Grocers Association and was appointed to represent them at the last Paris Exposition. He has been twice

elected a delegate to the National Editorial Convention from the Massachusetts State Press Association and now holds the responsible position of secretary of the Postal Law Committee of the National Editorial Association.
Mr. Floyd is widely known at home and abroad for his kindly, disinterested work in every association of which he has been a member. He is an active member in good standing of the Montreal Board of Trade, the Montreal Club, the St. George's Snow Shoe Club, the St. Lawrence Yacht Club, the Boston Press Club, Massachusetts Press Association, the American Trade Press Association, is secretary and treasurer of the New England Trade Press Association, and a member of the Author's Club, New York City, Seventh Regiment Veterans Association, as well as the Church Club of Delaware.
Few men can do many things and do them well. Edward Everett Hale is an exception to this general rule, and so also is Col. Robert Mitchell Floyd. Whatever he sets his hand and heart and brain to do he does with all the intense earnestness of his being, and the result is almost invariably a step forward, the placing of the stakes a little higher up the hill. The doing is to the accompaniment of such geniality, enthusiasm and good will, that to the onlooker the work is hidden and the labor seems a pastime. The untiring activity of this many-sided man has it in the broad horizon—outlook of the Westerner, and the hold-on tenacity of the New Englander, blended into a composite personality at once forceful and unique.—Aaron C. Sow the seed as early in the Spring as possible, roll the ground perfectly level; the grass should be cut often, and never allowed to attain a length of over three inches.
