"Never mind," he said to the boy, "the vessel has gone to Baltimore. I will advance the money for your ticket and you can go right down there and meet her."  
Full of enthusiasm, the boy agreed to go. He was offered whiskey, but refused it. On the trip south with him there were about fifteen other men and boys, most of them from the same town. They were hurried into a covered wagon, driven to the dock, carried to a vessel, in the harbor, and soon found themselves on the way down the bay.  
No lines are drawn by the "crimps" in meeting the demand for more men. Old men and boys, negroes and white, natives and foreigners, whether in fairly well-kept condition or abject poverty, are regarded alike; the "crimp" gets as much "per head," and one head is as good as another.  
Very many of the men who go "down the bay" on oyster vessels find themselves under indeterminate sentence, as it were. That they are there is about the only certain fact; when they will return is a matter of conjecture.  
Years ago, when oysters were so plentiful that to dredge up a boatload was a matter of a comparatively short time, most of the boats ran to market with their cargoes. But with depleted oyster beds a much longer time is required to secure a load, so that, to make the most of a profitable one, the dredgers were compelled to spend as much time as possible at work.  
Then the two other classes of vessels—the "run" boat and the "buy" boat—became common. Their function is to carry the catch of the dredgers to market. ### SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON Blood Making Tonic Treatment

**JESUS RISEN FROM THE DEAD. LESSON IX. MAY 31.**  
John 20: 1-18.  
Com. of 15, 16.  
**GOLDEN TEXT.**  
"I am He that liveth, and was dead; and behold, I am alive forever more." Rev. 1: 18.  
Time.—Morning of Sunday, April 9th, A.D. 30. Place.—Garden about Joseph's tomb.  
**EXPLANATIONS:**  
I. Peter and John Investigating, 1-10. All the apparent contradictions in the gospel narratives would disappear if we knew all the facts in the case. It was dark in more senses than one as Mary hurried toward the tomb in which she fancied her Lord lay, but she was determined to rise and bring to her the brightness and joy of an endless day. As soon as Mary saw the stone rolled away she jumped at the conclusion that the tomb had been rifled. Eagerly Peter and John ran to the tomb that was reported robbed. John, being the youngest, reached the tomb first, but in gentle reverence does not enter, but stooped to look in. Peter, true to his impetuous disposition, rushed right in and sees the linen clothes lying and the napkin that had been about Jesus' head carefully rolled up in a place by itself. This is an apparently insignificant detail, but is one in which there is deep significance. It shows us that Jesus in His supreme moment of His life displayed that same divine serenity and calmness that marked His whole career, and instead of excitedly snatching the napkin from His face and hurling it wherever it might fall, quietly took it off and in an orderly way rolled it up and laid it down in its place.  
II. Mary Weeping, 11-15. It was long kept Mary lingering at the sepulchre, it was unbelief that kept her weeping. Again and again had Jesus told His disciples that He was to be crucified, buried, and that He should arise again the third day. But this was contrary to the ideas that they could not understand it, and it found no lodgment in their minds. His enemies remembered it (Matt. 27: 63), but His friends did not. No wonder Jesus rebuked them for their unbelief and hardness of heart. Mark 16: 14; Luke 24: 25, 26). Mary looks into the tomb to see if after all there is not some mistake about it, half hoping to see the body of her crucified Saviour lying there. She sees two angels, but she has no eyes for them. It is her Lord Himself she wants. Half in wonder and altogether in protest the angels exclaim,
