...The Sabbath morning meeting of the Young Men's Guild, Montague, was held Jan. 14th as usual in their room at 9.45. The subject for the morning was "The Lamb of God" and the essay was read by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Wright. Many of the members spoke briefly on the subject expressing their appreciation of the able manner in which the reverend gentleman handled the topic. Next Sabbath the subject will be "The Life of Paul"—Acts—the essayist being Fred McLean.

...A meeting of the managing Committee of the King's County Seed Fair was held in Georgetown on Monday, January 15th. It was decided to hold the Fair at Georgetown on Friday, March 1st. Mr. Dock McKinnon, Commissioner of agriculture, was present and took part in the discussion. As Commissioner of Agriculture he offered financial assistance to the extent of 2-3 of the money paid in prizes for seed up to \$50.00. The Committee decided that no seed would be admitted for competition unless the exhibitor had for sale as per sample exhibited, a certain amount of seed. R. R. McLean, S. R. Aitken, President and Secretary were appointed a committee to prepare the prize list. It is intended that a Poultry Show at which liberal prizes shall be offered, will be held in connection with the Seed Fair. It was decided to leave the arranging of the Agricultural meeting with the Department of Agriculture.

...PRIZES CONTINUE HIGH FOR FISH.

BOSTON, Jan. 12.—The schooner Gladys and Nellie is here with a banner fare, consisting of 50,000 pounds of haddock, 30,000 pounds of cod, 30,000 pounds of hake, 800 pounds of crab and 1000 pounds of pollock.

...Capt. Frank Watts and his crew struck his Belting to the eastward where several fine fares have been taken recently. As prices continue high Capt. Watts and crew will realize a big sum as their share of the proceeds of the trip.

...A total of 14 arrivals were at T. dock this morning for the fishing trade. Other large fares are well arriving yesterday with 37,000 pounds and the schooners Ethie M. Prior with 52,000 pounds.

...TEACH MORALS BY PICTURES.

BOSTON, Jan. 12.—Teaching morality in the public schools by means of photographs from actual life, and showing what is right and what is wrong, has been given its first test in the public schools of Fitchburg.

...The pictures themselves, taken in proper series, are depended upon to impress on the children's minds the rights and wrongs of certain questions arising every day, such as fights between boys, squabbles between girls and playing games fairly.

...The teacher gives a few words of explanation, which may frequently broaden out into a lecture. A number of lectures have been prepared by Milton Fairchild, the originator of the project. Some of the lectures, with the pictures, are to be given in Fitchburg this week. The work is under the supervision of Prof. H. C. Harbour, of the Fitchburg High School.

...AMERICAN RIFLE TEAMS COMING TO CANADA.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—At the annual meeting of the National Rifle Association of America, last night, it was decided to send teams to Ottawa, Ont., and to the Olympic games in Sweden this summer. The executive committee of the organization was entrusted with the mapping out of details. Lieut. Gen. John C. Bates, U. S. A., retired, was elected president for the coming year.

...ALL DICKENS KIN ARE NOT NEEDY.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—"Why should I be preparing a benefit for the Dickens family," interrogated Cyril Maude, when asked about a report to this effect. "One has already been arranged for them, that is, for the daughters of the artist's son, Charles. Other members of the Dickens family strongly object to being made the recipients of public charity."

...I am unable to reach Sir George Alexander tonight, but nothing is known here of any intention on his part to emulate Seymour Hicks, who is managing the benefit performance to be given under the auspices of the Daily Telegraph."

...SHILOH YACHT IN DANGER.

BOSTON, Jan. 12.—The steam yacht Barracouta, owned by the Rev. Edjah Sanford, was in danger of crashing into shipping in the upper harbor yesterday. The heavy north-west wind started the yacht dragging from her anchorage on South Boston flats toward a fleet of schooners and barges. Additional anchors were dropped and the Barracouta was finally brought up.

...WILL LET MISSIONARIES STAY.

LISBON, Jan. 12.—The government commission announces that American and British missionaries will be allowed to remain in Portuguese East Africa. This decision was taken after conferences had held with the diplomatic representatives of these three countries here. Portugal, however, has decided to establish her own missions in Africa, to counter-balance the influence of foreign missionaries.

WOMAN MAYOR IS NOW SUPREME.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 12.—Mrs. Ella Wilson reigns supreme in Hunnell, Kan. All but three members of the troublesome city council have resigned, and the woman mayor can no longer be confronted with the defiance of the city council, that "if she does not sign it we will pass the measure over her veto."

...When she vetoes a measure, that settles it, and if a councilman desires to obtain the passage of a measure he must be certain that the mayor approves of it, and will sign it. This means the councilmen are not considered of Mrs. Mayor. When they meet they are not at defiance as they were before Mrs. Wilson appealed to Governor Stubbs.

...The governor answered the appeal by instructing the Attorney-General to bring suits to oust the six councilmen.

...This he did and as the cost of the suit might fall upon the councilmen if they were ousted, those who had property at once resigned.

...The suits are proceeding, however, and will be heard by the State Supreme Court in February. In the meantime the council of three and the woman mayor are conducting the affairs of the little city of Hunnell without any trouble, because the mayor can veto any act of the councilmen she desires, and the three are not a majority of the body, and cannot pass any measure over the veto.

NEW WRINKLE IN SHOPLIFTING.

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 12.—Mrs. Thomas H. Gopp, of 178 Passaic street, was arrested today on a charge of wholesale shoplifting. Proinent merchants charge that after she stole the goods she kept them for a short time and then returned them, getting back the money. The merchants say they have lost thousands of dollars through such operations.

...The merchants declare that they noted the frequency with which the same woman demanded cash for returned goods and were puzzled, because she never was able to produce sales slips, and no record of the purchase could be found. The police say the woman always priced the goods before she stole them, so that she was able to know the purchase price when she returned them.

SPANISH CABINET RESIGNS.

MADRID, Jan. 14.—The Spanish cabinet of which Joe E. Canalejas was premier, resigned today. The cabinet resigned as the result of a divergence of views with King Altonso as to the advisability of coming out into the streets of one of the rioters who murdered a judge and wounded several court officials in the town of Callera, province of Valencia, last September.

HER PANCAKES LED TO MARRIAGE ALTAR.

KENT, Conn., Jan. 12.—Edward Wilmot a well to do farmer advertised two weeks ago for a cook "who can cook pancakes as they should be cooked." Miss Hilda Spink thought she could cook pancakes that way and a week ago Monday she was engaged to prevent any cessation of the pancakes supply Mr. Wilmot proposed marriage the following Friday and on Saturday they were married. Their friends are wishing them long life and pancakes.

REVOLUTION IN PARAGUAY.

BUENOS AYRES, Jan. 16.—The Paraguayan revolutionaries have captured President Liberato Roas, and have forced him to resign. He fled to a telegram received here today from Asuncion, the Paraguayan capital. The garrison in the city remained neutral.
