DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN BOSTON HOME

BOSTON, May 5.—A double tragedy believed by the police to be a case of murder and suicide, was discovered in South Boston today, when Miss Meda Weigand found her father, Wm. Weigand and her mother, Mrs. Martha Weigand dead in bed, the doors and windows tightly closed and illuminating gas pouring from an open jet.

Miss Weigand awakened by the odor of escaping gas, went to her parents room and after forcing in the door found them dead in bed. The room was practically hermetically sealed, all the cracks and keyholes having been stuffed with paper. Mrs. Weigand had previously attempted suicide and it is believed by the police that during the night she arose while her husband slept, and after making complete preparations for her dreadful act turned on the gas and lay down beside her husband to die. Weigand was 36 years of age and his wife was 48.

U.S. FOLLOWING THE LURE OF GOLD AND ADVENTURE

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Not since the republican guns were unlimbered against the democratic free list bill by minority leader Mann over a week ago, has the debate in the house developed such an attack on the measure as was made today by representative Hill, of Connecticut, a republican member of the ways and means committee, one of the leading republican advocates of the Canadian reciprocity bill.

Mr. Hill declared that instead of \$10,000,000 reduction in revenue as the democrats expected, the farmers' free list might make a reduction of \$50,000,000 and that its effect upon business would be to transfer many flourishing industries to Europe.

Mr. Hill explained that the International Harvester Company and other great manufacturers would be able under the democratic bill to manufacture their machines cheaply abroad, and bring them into this country to be assembled by cheap labor here.

Mr. Hill declared that the democratic bill would admit almost anything free of duty. Mr. Hill particularly attacked the bill for making manufactured products free of duty, like shoes, harness, saddlery and the like, while leaving a duty against the raw materials that American manufacturers have to import.

Mr. Hill's whole argument was from the standpoint of the American manufacturer.

Mr. Fecht, of Pennsylvania, also against the bill, had a tilt with Mr. Sims, of Tennessee, who objected to Mr. Fecht's statement that tariff debate was costing the country \$10,000 a minute. Mr. Sims said the expense to the country would be the same whether the house were in session or not.

"We do not call the extra session," retorted Mr. Fecht, "you had to make your agreement with the White House that you would pass the reciprocity bill."

"Who owns the White House?" asked Mr. Sims.

"You act as if you did," returned Mr. Fecht, "and you act as though you really had the president now."

Mr. Fecht predicted an early invasion of Mexico, saying an army officer associated with him had told him that the army was going over the Mexican border "to stay."

"I would not think that the president would object," said Mr. Fecht. "We have been absorbing everything they did not want in Europe for years and years. We have taken as much in stock what nobody wanted, the Philippines, another white man's burden. We added a little more in the West Indies. Why couldn't we occupy something that is worth something and where we could be of some great good to somebody. I am not a soldier of fortune. I do not expect to be at the head of the army, but I believe this will be a mighty interesting question before the house adjourns."

Mr. Fecht contended that the United States wanted copper and iron and was about to follow the "lure of gold and the call of adventure."

PASTOR QUILTS BECAUSE BALL TEAM LOSES

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 3.—Because he likes the baseball of the Detroit brand better than the quality of the sport in St. Louis the Rev. Dr. Homer B. Henderson, an ardent fan, announced his resignation today from the pastorate of the Wagoner Place United Presbyterian Church to accept a call from the First United Presbyterian Church of the Michigan City. Dr. Henderson will depart for Detroit June 1.

When a college student at Xenia, O., Dr. Henderson became a baseball enthusiast. He was graduated six years ago and since that time he served a church in eastern Ontario for three years; for the same period of time he has been pastor of the Wagoner Place United Presbyterian Church of this city.

WOMEN IN THE METHODIST CHURCH

TORONTO, May 5.—Under no circumstances are women to represent the Methodist Church at its annual conference. The decision was arrived at yesterday by the court of appeals of the Methodist Church. The question was raised by the British Columbia conference, where a woman elected by a quarterly official board to represent a church at an annual conference was refused admission on arrival. Another important matter was the definition of the individual powers of the church quarterly and trust boards. It was decided that the functions of the board are so distinct as to make any co-operation impossible except in matters of finance.

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COTTON KINGS SCORE IN COURT

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The appeal of the Government in the so called "corner case" indictment against James A. Patton, Eugene C. Seales, Frank B. Haynes and Wm. B. Brown, was docketed today in the Supreme Court of the United States. The Government is aggrieved because Judge Noyes dismissed the "corner counts" in the indictment.

The appeal today brings a new question for the Supreme Court to decide, whether "corner" on a stock exchange constitutes a conspiracy in restraint of trade, or a monopoly of inter-State commerce in defiance of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Patton, Brown, Haynes and Seales, were charged by the Government with leading the May cotton corner of 1910 on the New York Cotton Exchange. It was rumored at the time that these men had made between \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000 of their deals in May, July and August.

THE SICK AT ACADIA SEMINARY

WOLFVILLE, May 4.—The east wing of the seminary has been opened for the senior class, most of whom have returned, and also the teachers. The west wing is used as a hospital and quite apart. A number of the patients have been critically ill, but most of them are past the danger point. Miss Mariam Lockwood, whose parents, Dr. and Mrs. Lockwood, are here from Lockport, is at present very low, but hopes are entertained that she will survive the crisis. Miss Black of Amherst and Miss Goffrey of Shelburne are also very ill, but with excellent nurses and the best of medical attention it is hoped that the worst is over. One case has developed on the Ridge, outside the town, son of Lewis Murphy.
