THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

Sixty-six years ago on 9th November 1841, King Edward VII was born at Buckingham Palace. A little more than three years later, Queen Alexandra was born at Copenhagen, December 1st, 1844. They were married on March 10th 1863, and their happy union has now lasted considerably over sixty-four years. Few, if any of the monarchs of ancient or modern times were so fortunate in their partnership, or in the circumstances under which they ascended the throne. His father, the late Prince Consort, and his mother, our late noble Queen Victoria were models of those worthy and great qualities which adorn the highest stations in life, and were devotedly attached to each other and to their children.

King Edward was in his sixtieth year when he came to the throne at the death of Queen Victoria in January 1901. He had enjoyed careful training in public affairs and had for many years taken an active interest in national and international concerns at home and abroad, before he was called to put on the crown. He enjoyed a large measure of personal popularity; he was happily married to a Princess greatly esteemed and beloved, their children had grown up about them; the long, prudent and prosperous reign of Queen Victoria had established the throne on a surer basis and entrenched it in the hearts of the people more firmly than ever before.

It was under such favorable auspices that King Edward was called to the throne of the vast British Empire. His loyal subjects had great hope and confidence that he would prove a capable, constitutional Sovereign. This hope and confidence however, hardly exceeded so far as to expect that in comparison with the previous unexampled reign there might not be some points of failure. The standard had been set very high by Queen Victoria:

"Her court was pure; her life serene; God gave her peace; her land reposed; A thousand claims to reverence closed: In her as Mother, Wife and Queen."

King Edward has not disappointed the best hopes and expectations of his people. On the contrary, he has far exceeded them. In nearly seven years that he has borne the sceptre he has steadily advanced in kingly stature and dignity, and has evinced so much wisdom, tact and good will such soundness of judgment and wise discretion as have made him a leading figure among the greater rulers of the earth. His ability as a diplomat has improved the relations of the Empire on every side, and his great work as peacemaker among the nations has surpassed that of any Sovereign of modern times. Not less even than Victoria he is loved and revered by his people today, and like her he enjoys a wide sphere of respect and regard far beyond the far flung boundaries of the British Empire.

In connection with the King's birthday it is to be noted, that His Majesty has set a noble example of filial reverence in preferring that the birthday of his Mother should be honored above his own. It is by his desire that the 24th of May rather than the 9th of November is now honored with loyal and ceremonial observance. This is a tribute not only to the late Queen, who was so greatly revered and beloved by the British people every where but is also a tribute to the higher law, Honor thy father and mother. Thus our noble King sets a fine example to his people which has touched many hearts and moves millions to pray that his day may be long and happy.

THE GAS ENGINE.

The world has heard much of late about the turbine steam engine, which is now driving big ships across the Atlantic at railway speed. It has heard less about the rapid development of the gas engine,

which has come to be also a great factor in the industrial development of nearly all civilized lands. At first the gas engines made were mostly small, and used in supplying power for small industries. For this they were admirably adapted, being ready for use at any moment, without loss of time in firing up, as is the case with the steam engine.

Gas engines of large size and great power have more recently come into use. Some of these are gas producers, making the gas which they use. There are many gas engines in Germany and not a few in the United States of 3,000 to 10,000 horse power each. A notable instance of the installation of gas engines on a large scale is recorded by the Boston Journal. The Indiana Steel Company is constructing an enormous plant at Gary, to cost \$75,000,000. Six thousand men are now employed on the work. The power plant will use 100,000 horse-power, and the whole of this power will be furnished by big gas engines.

LONGBOAT AND BAD ROAD

The Indian runner, Longboat, recently broke down in a long-distance race between Hamilton and Toronto, as a Globe reporter pointed out, because of the abject condition of the roads. We hear much complaint at times of the roads in Prince Edward Island. Here is The Globe's description of the road which wore out the Indian runner:

"Through mud both slippery and sticky, through sand, gravel and broken rock, along isolated, untravelled highways, the Indian picked his uncertain footing. At times he ran in the ditches, and again on the high banks along the roads, and over soggy stretches of road in which waggon wheels had sunk almost axle deep. Between Burlington and Oakville the route is in many places unfit for vehicular traffic, let alone for foot-racing."

The Globe in editorial comment points out that one of Longboat's ancestors in the days of Indian supremacy would probably have found as good a path through the then unbroken forest as the Indian runner now found between the two principal cities of Ontario. This is bad enough in all conscience. We all know that things were in many respects backward in the big Province by the Lakes, but surely after being united in one Dominion, with the alert and progressive Eastern Provinces for forty years things should now be in better shape.

The refusal of the Department of Justice to advise the commutation of the sentence of death in the Collins case was to be expected. The crime, for which he was convicted and sentenced to death was a most brutal and atrocious one. To commute the sentence would establish a precedent which would practically abolish capital punishment, a step which this country is not yet prepared to take.

A correspondent sends us a sarcastic letter about the new railway station at Tracadie, the waiting room of which, he says, was finished in August but is not yet opened to the public, and that during the cold, wet weather of the fall the people have sought shelter in the freight shed. This is the first we have heard of the matter. If the facts are as stated, there must be some reason that we do not know of for the delay in opening the station.
