The Funeral

Governmental machinery was already in motion tonight working out the details of a state funeral, to be held in St. Paul's Church - first Protestant church to be erected in British North America - on Monday afternoon. The body will be sent to Truro later that afternoon and will be interred in the Anglican cemetery there on the following day.

Outstanding Canadian

Frank Stanfield's life, while essentially Nova Scotian and Canadian, was closely bound up with the growth of his native town. There he maintained his permanent home, and it was there that his greatest business interests were. Colchester County sent him to the provincial legislature time and again. His career in politics could have been greater than it was. Already an outstanding man in the Canadian business world by reason of the success of Stanfield's Limited, the underwear firm built up by himself and his brother John, now Senator Stanfield, he was sent to Halifax as a Conservative in 1916. He did not offer in 1920, but in 1925 was one of the chief factors in the Conservative organization which swept the Liberals out of office for the first time in 43 years.

Great Executive Ability

In many quarters Stanfield has been credited with the executive ability which made victory for his party possible. He could have had a Cabinet position, but preferred to remain a private member, a guide in committee, a power in party caucus. Lt. Governor Stanfield was no orator, but with his broad shoulders and easy carriage, wealth of white hair and aquiline features, he brought poise and distinguished bearing to his position. Formal state functions, it is true to say, bored him. He was a genial companion, more at home in conversation than on the platform. Even in the Legislature, he rarely rose to speak. When he did so, the benches were all attention, but he was never the target of opposition gibes.

A Protectionist

An outspoken protectionist, a strong party man well known for uncompromising frankness, he was too big a figure for the butt of party bickering in a provincial house. Frank Stanfield, with his brother John, purchased control of the Truro Knitting Mills from their father, Charles Edward Stanfield in 1896. It was this business which ten years later became Stanfield's Limited, a company with a total capital of \$1,250,000. The business had been started by Charles Stanfield, who came from England to Prince Edward Island and thence to Truro. On \$11,000, the brothers re-organized the business and decided to specialize in high quality underwear. New methods and processes were adopted, patents were taken out and an advertising campaign initiated. In 1907 John Stanfield was elected to the Dominion House and Frank became managing director of Stanfield's. It was at this stage in his career, the success of the industry assured, that he began to turn his attention to outside interests. In 1908 he became associated in the McLeod Paper Co., whose mills were afterwards purchased by F. B. McCurdy, later organized the Stanfield Smith Co., wholesale stationers, and organized and controlled Reindeer Ltd., manufacturers of coffee and condensed milk, which was sold to the Borden Milk Company. In 1911 he organized the Truro Foundry Co., which, during the war was sold to Truro Steel, and in 1916, the Amherst Woolen Mills. Constant widening of his contracts in Nova Scotia brought him in touch with the coal and steel industries, and for ten years he served as a director of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co. He resigned from the board when this company was sold to the British Empire Steel Corporation, taking as his attitude that the shareholders and province were not sufficiently safeguarded in the transaction. In subsequent business associations, he was connected with the board of directors of the Eastern Car Company, when that company was formed, and with the Nova Scotia Car Co., later destroyed by the Halifax explosion. He was associated with the Nova Scotia Fire Insurance Co., the Atlantic Fire Insurance Co., and the Nova Scotia Clay Works. Up to the time of his death he retained a close and active interest in the business which he had helped to build, and in addition to this association he was chairman of the executive of the Acadia Trust Co., a director of Nova Scotia Light and Power, Moir's Limited, The Royal Bank, The Mersey Paper Co., the Maritime Life, Central Agencies Ltd., and other industries.
