

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P. E. Island Tea Blamed In Death

ARSENIC FOUND IN BLEND DRUNK BY OTTAWA RESIDENT

OTTAWA, April 15—A coroner's jury investigating the death last March 25 of Thomas S. Cole, Ottawa patent solicitor, returned a verdict tonight that "the cause of death was inanition (starvation) which was consistent with chronic arsenical poisoning."

Two doctors, J. H. Laidlaw and John E. Plunkett, told the jury that Cole's death was caused by starvation due to inability to take food, Dr. T. R. Little, who performed the post-mortem, concluded death was due to chronic arsenical poisoning and that there were evidences of starvation.

Cole's widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Cole said her husband was a heavy tea drinker, consuming about ten cups a day. The tea he drank was a special imported brand.

Dr. J. S. G. Spivell, consulting city analyst, said examination of the brand of tea Cole drank revealed the presence of arsenic, although there was not more than allowed by the Pure Foods Act of the International Treaty. He said the tea was received by Cole through a Prince Edward Island importer. Mrs. Cole said she believed it was a Montreal importer and it came from Ceylon and "some other place."

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
