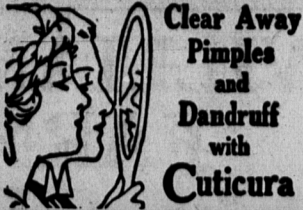

MEASURES TO GUARD AGAINST SUB MENACE

OTTAWA, June 6.—The Canadian naval authorities have taken precautions to protect as far as possible Canadian Atlantic ports and shipping against the new submarine menace. As a matter of fact the arrival of German submarines of a new type on this side of the Atlantic has been anticipated for some time and port defences were strengthened and proper precautionary measures were taken, the details of which cannot of course be given out in the press. In regulations recently issued regarding the port of Sydney and published in the Canadian Gazette, the following paragraph, for instance, denotes the precautions taken:

—Masters of vessels are especially warned that it may become necessary in the event of an attack on the port being imminent to remove buoys or extinguish lights without notice."

—Either by day or by night no vessels are allowed to enter the harbor without adhering strictly to all detailed regulations of the naval authorities. "Canada has a considerable number of armed naval patrol boats now constantly looking for submarines.

AN EPITAPH TO A SHELL

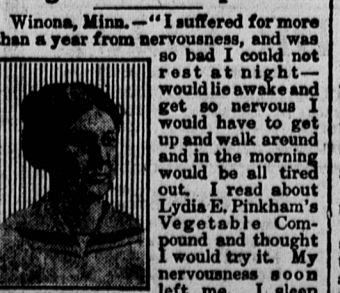

SENATOR LODGE DEFENDS THE NAVY

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Attacks on the Navy for permitting submarines to sink American vessels off the Atlantic coast precipitated a sharp debate today in the Senate. Charges that Senators invited the attacks by making inaccurate statements as to conditions in the United States were made by Senator Lewis (Democrat) of Illinois, in reply to a newspaper editorial read by Senator Brandagee of Connecticut, which attacked the Navy Department for not warning mariners of the presence of undersea craft and asked as to the whereabouts of destroyers and submarine chasers the Navy has been getting ready to repel attacks.

The U-boat raids were not attempted, Senator Lewis declared, until Germany was advised by inaccurate information that the American Government was "honeycombed with fraud" and "reeking" with pollution and corruption that the United States had no army or navy, and "That we had fallen down in every undertaking."

"These charges," he said, "induced Germany to believe that we could not defend our own country."

With apparent feeling, Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, Republican, said: "Nothing has stimulated and invited Germany as the loose brags and boasts about the number of troops we are transporting to France. Germany was not invited here by attacks on the Navy, because there have been none. The Navy and the Navy Department have taken precaution. No doubt in some newspaper offices there are men who might have done better."

The Navy's activities cannot be made public for patent reasons, Senator Lodge said, declaring no one can tell where a submarine will strike.

"As soon as the Navy had any authentic news, indicating the presence of submarines," he added, "they acted. They had the means to do it."

Citing the fight of the British Navy for four years against the submarines, Senator Lodge said that with American assistance a "large control" of the submarine menace had been established on what might be termed the "naval front."

"That control is succeeding," he said more than any of us dare to hope. It is done by multiplication of ships and of methods."

"That the defence will be effective I have no question," continued Senator Lodge.

Possibilities of a submarine base in the Western Hemisphere seems remote, said Senator Lodge, pointing out the difficulty of getting a mother ship out of Germany and adding that "it is improbable that the Germans have a base on the United States or the Canadian coasts." He also thought no base could be had in the West Indies.

"It is impossible to have a base on Mexican territory," he said, "and a base there cannot be easily used, it would be extremely difficult to get to and to get away from there in more than a month."

The precautions the Navy has taken along the Gulf Coast cannot be revealed, the Senator added.
