

STORY OF DEATH IN THE ARCTIC

Two White Men Believed to have Been Murdered by Eskimos in the North.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—A story from two sources differing only in minor details reached Ottawa today, announcing the death, at the hands of an Eskimo band in the far north of Canada last summer, of two explorers, George Street, Ottawa, and H. V. Radford, an American, with whom the Ottawa man left for a journey into the arctic, two years ago.

TARIFF BILL PASSED SENATE

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The Democratic tariff revision bill passed the Senate this afternoon by a vote of 44 to 37. There is a general reduction in the tariff over the former schedule of about 28 per cent.

BRAKEMAN KILLED AT SPRINGHILL JUNCTION.

AMHERST, Sept. 8.—While shunting at Springhill Junction tonight, about eight o'clock, brakeman Percy LeBlanc, of Moncton, on No. 288 train, better known as "the Springhill Cannon Ball," accidentally caught his foot in the frog of the rails and five cars passed over his body, killing him instantly.

O'LEARY

The first stop west of Summerside, was at O'Leary. This is one of the villages which have grown up with the railway. Before railway days the site now occupied by the town was a wilderness, and for miles on either side of it the forest primeval.

Alberton, the oldest of the western villages, is this year experiencing the benefits of the iron industry and at present there is a decided boom. EXECUTION OF ENTIRE COMPANY
