JOSEPH T. GALLANT

On Dec 20th, 1929, there passed peacefully away at his home in Plusville, Joseph T. Gallant, after a lingering illness. Deceased was born in Plusville 67 years ago. He received his early education in the village school in Plusville.

In 1888 he married Miss Judith Dorrion of Reutic who predeceased him fifteen years ago. Of this marriage seven children were born of whom five are living, namely John on the homestead and Isidore of Plusville, Mrs. Steve Arsenault and Cecelia of Somerville, Mass., and Mrs. Lawrence Peters of Bloomfield.

In 1920 he married Mrs. Agnes Arsenault of Howland, by whom he had one son Oscar. Six brothers also survive, S. T. Gallant, of Charlottetown, Inspector of Fisheries; E. M. of the Aluminum Park Sub-division Co., Summerside; James T. of Plusville; Isidore of New Bedford, Mass; Thomas of Warren, N. H.; Paul of Warren, R. I. He was the possessor of one of the best farms in Plusville, including a very fine fox ranch. He superintended this and placed them in good standing, while he devoted his time to his trade as carpenter and building contractor. His industry and thrift brought their reward in the way of substantial prosperity.

Following in his brother's footsteps he took an active part in political interest of the Island. He contested the first district of Prince in behalf of the Conservative party in the years 1923 and 1927 and was defeated by a small majority. His fine character and generous disposition won for him the confidence and esteem of the community. He received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church and was administered by his pastor Rev. J. A. Gaudet. The funeral took place on Dec. 23rd., from his home to St. Anthony's Church where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by his parish priest Rev. J. A. Gaudet, assisted by Rev. J. A. MacDonald of St. Mark's Lot 7 and Rev. T. Campbell of Alberton as Deacon and Sub-deacon. Interment took place in the presence of a large number of people who showed their sorrow for the loss of a good and kindly husband and father and their heartfelt sympathy for the widow and family, be reaved by his death. R. I. P.

Saskatchewan Is Not Satisfied With Commission

REGINA, Jan. 23.—Saskatchewan will not agree to the Commission suggested by Premier Mackenzie King in his proposals for the return of the natural resources, according to the reply submitted by the Provincial Government to Premier King. The Provincial Government suggests a commission of three, one chosen by the Dominion Government, one by the Provincial Government and a third commissioner chosen by either the Imperial Government or both the Provincial and Dominion Governments. This commission would hear the claims of Saskatchewan for all alienations subsequent to 1905.

The Provincial Government is also prepared to refer its claims to the Supreme Court of Canada, subject to an appeal to the Privy Council. Should the contentions of the Provincial Government be upheld by the courts, the question of accounting between 1870 and 1905 would then be referred to the chosen Commission. On an agreement being arrived at, the question of compensations and the amendment to the legislation would be then submitted to the Provincial Legislature at an early date that it might be given effect to by the Imperial Government.

The three debating societies at St. Dunstons University held their first debates since the reopening after the Christmas holiday. St. Thomas had an open debate. Five subjects were posted and every man could choose the subject and prepare a speech of about 15 minutes. The results were highly satisfactory. Saint John's had an interesting debate on the subject "Resolved that bachelors and spinsters over 33 years should be taxed by the Provincial government." The result was a victory for the pro side by a majority of 2 points.

In Saint Auguston's society the subject of "Resolved that the Fox Industry is more profitable than the Potato industry, made a lively debate, the pro side was also the victor.

The corridor teams at St. Dunstons have all been organized and several lively games have taken place. These teams are made up of the players who are not on the first or second teams. The competition for championship is being lively contested by the teams and keenly followed by each of their adherents.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The Atlantic Coast Fisheries Company is negotiating with the Government of Newfoundland for concessions, F. W. Bryce said here today. Mr. Bryce declined to reveal what concessions were proposed, stating that any information would have to come from Sir Richard Squires, Premier of Newfoundland. Reports were however that the company would be allowed to erect plants and operate trawlers on the coast of Newfoundland. Mr. Bryce said Sir Richard Squires had been laying plans for the Department of Fisheries some time and had intended to encourage private enterprise. The fact that Newfoundland is in a strategic geographical position for supplying the markets of Europe made the situation especially interesting to the Atlantic Coast Fisheries Company which has extensive European marketing connections he said. The Atlantic Coast Fisheries Company is incorporated in Maine, but the head office is in New York.

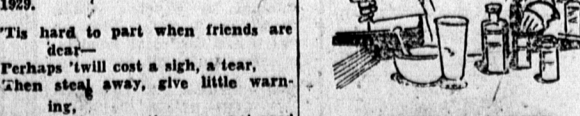

could be secured, the United States could also reduce. Col. the Hon. J. L. Ralston, Canadian Minister of National Defense promised Canada's full co-operation. Australia too, through Hon. J. E. Penton her Minister of Trade promised 100 per cent co-operation.

Premier Andre Tardieu of France in an eloquent speech cited many statistics in outlining the position of France. He placed the needs of France as a maritime power on three bases: 1, geographic; 2, economic and 3, military. It was possible however, Premier Tardieu declared, to transfer the needs of France into terms of relativity. In other words he added, if the decisions of this conference result in an increased sense of security in France so much more will it be possible for France to reduce.

Doni Grandi, for Italy like Premier MacDonald and Premier Tardieu, recognized the link between reduction of armaments and a sense of security. But security, he added, was a factor which could not be determined absolutely. If everybody tried to obtain absolute security the conference would probably end in an increase of armaments. The Conference must therefore consider security in a relative reciprocal way. Italy was ready for the maximum reduction, but would leave it to other powers to determine the size of armaments, reserving the right to regulate her own armament by herself. Finally, for Japan, Ex-Premier Wakatsuki said Japan's policy was based on peace and economy. She joined the others in a desire to reduce armaments consistent with security. New Zealand, South Africa and Indian representatives spoke in a similar vein.

While drizzling rain fell on the dark turrets of St. James Palace, the delegates set around a great three-sided table in the Queen Anne's drawing room and heard the deliberations. Sir Maurice Hankey was elected Secretary General of the conference. The conference adjourned at 11.50 a. m. and the chief delegates will resume the private conversations which have already been under way all week.

Most outstanding was a scheduled afternoon meeting of the British, French and Italians, with Premier Ramsay MacDonald at 10 Downing St. It was most interesting, most informing and friendly. Prime Minister MacDonald told the press in reporting on the session. "The business was a report of the naval needs of each country, not in terms of naval strength, but in terms of geographical position and political responsibilities. There were no hostile questions of one delegation to another. Mr. MacDonald said private conversations concerned the size of the fleets of the five powers and possibility of a common agreement to reduce these fleets to the minimum. Conference observers considered that the French attitude involved among other things disinclination to grant naval parity to Italy and marked leanings towards use of submarines. Conversations between the British, United States and French delegations were believed however to have smoothed somewhat the French differences with the other powers. Premier MacDonald explained the complexities were great and involved tedious work of preparation. If some test proposal be published prematurely, he pointed out the conference might come to an abortive end. The general attitude of the five powers as presented to the conference today may be broadly outlined as follows. The United States naval strength could be reduced if the conference finds a basis for agreement. National requirements are largely relative. Stimson maintained, he said the keynote of the United States requirements is parity with Great Britain.

Prime Minister MacDonald emphasized the necessity of Great Britain free access to the sea and to satisfy the will to live. He said that was the foundation of the British naval problem and indicated the risk to Great Britain in being a small island twenty miles from Europe and dependent on sea born traffic. The Empire representatives addressed the conference briefly and in general terms regarding the importance of the success of the conference. Foreign Minister Dino Grandi urged the necessity for security of each country from a relative and reciprocal standpoint. He also stressed the relation of naval requirements to other armaments. He said Italy recognizes the connection between armament requirements and security and accepts the principle of the League of Nations that armaments should be reduced to a point compatible with defence needs.

Reijiro Wakatsuki for Japan said the Conference should bring a reduction of the peoples burdens in armament, assuring security to each nation and doing away with suspicion of each other. He said every aspect of national needs must be considered.

Late Market News

MONTREAL, Que. Jan. 23.—The selection in egg prices by some whole sales here a few days ago has now become general and the market more even in spite of the fact that further reductions have been made in the prices of all fresh varieties. Demand for storage eggs continues however, with a moderate supply available. Prices now range from 58 to 60 cents.

The local butter market continued to reflect the prospective further arrivals from New Zealand with lower prices in the offing. Quotations today were from 36 to 36 1-2 cents a pound for New Zealand finest and to retailers 40 and 41 cents. The cheese and potatoe markets continued quiet with a slightly duller tone in the latter.

OTTAWA, Ont. Jan. 23.—The egg market in Eastern Canada appears to have again taken a weaker tone today and some further price reductions are reported. Toronto—Egg receipts here are in excess and the market is lower and irregular. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 48 to 50; firsts 45 to 46; pullet extras 42 to 43; seconds 36 to 38. Prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 55-56; firsts 53-54; pullet extras 50; seconds 46-48.

MONTREAL, Que. Jan. 23.—This egg market is quiet. Fresh extras are steady, but quotations on firsts and pullet extras from British Columbia are one to three cents lower. Carlots of both fresh and storage eggs continue to arrive from the United States. Storage eggs have been bought at from 39 3-4 to 40 3-4 delivered duty paid. There is a good demand here for storage seconds which are selling to retailers at 43-44.

St. John, Jan. 23.—This egg market is easy and irregular and extras are lower, particularly in wholesale prices. Fresh eggs are now selling to retailers at extras 55-56; firsts 50-52; seconds 42 to 45. Storage eggs are no longer quoted.

HALIFAX, N. S. Jan. 23.—There has been a general lowering of prices in this egg market during the present week. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 48-50; firsts 40-42; seconds 40. Prices to retailers are extras 60-72; firsts 55-57; seconds 40-42. Chilled spot 42 1-2, feby fresh 29 to 30.

Spain today was added to Germany as among the powers, needing perhaps to be consulted before any complete five power agreement is reached in the naval conference. Revelations by Hector Bywater the distinguished British naval authority show that Spain is constructing large battleships with 15 inch guns, and in Mr. Bywater's words "embodying features which in their way are as novel and as revolutionary as those which characterized the German single pocket battleship, the "Ersatz Preussen."

The Conference probably will go down in history as the driest on record. Not a drop of liquor was obtainable anywhere in St. James Palace. The thirsty delegates who engaged temporarily from the plenary session were forced to choose between tea, coffee and lemonade. An official communique, gives the following paraphrase of Prime Minister MacDonald's statement.

The Prime Minister said his Government was fully alive to the difficulty of relating national need to national need but sooner or later the conference must face its difficulties, and resolve them. While a statement of needs was important, a claim for naval strength must always be related to risk; to build up a navy merely on needs is an exceedingly foolish undertaking. Naval forces and military forces are required, not because a country has certain economic needs and certain lengths of coastlines and so on, but are based upon an estimate of how far there is a threat of deprivation of those needs, a threat to the security of those coastlines. He said British naval strength was required to embrace our own kin and kin and members of our own family to keep interrelations with the Motherland. He emphasized that the British naval forces must necessarily be dispersed in every sea in the world. They must be divided into three groups at the very least, with various sub groups, not for fighting purposes but for police and peace purposes.
