THE FARMERS AND THE PARTIES.

With the possible exception of British Columbia the farmers constitute much the largest class following one occupation in any Province of Canada. And yet as a class they have actually less control over legislation than the manufacturers, the mine operators, the railway and transportation companies, the other great corporate interests of the country, or the professional classes.

If we pause to analyse the average House of Commons at Ottawa we shall find therein fifty to sixty lawyers, forty or fifty merchants, twenty to twenty-five manufacturers and less than a score of men whose chief business is the cultivation of the soil. We shall find nearly as many doctors as farmers, and half as many newspaper men, while the number of presidents, managers and directors of the various corporate interests in the House will outnumber the farmers three or four to one.

The twenty farmers who are elected to seats in The House are, by the custom of the time divided between the two parties, say in the proportion of fourteen to six. In either the Liberal or the Tory caucus where policies are shaped or approved this limited number is very easily outvoted and practically has little or

nothing to do with determining the result, and when some measure for the raising or lowering of the tariff is to be decided they follow their leaders precisely as other party men do.

It is obvious that the few farmers who sit in Parliament being thus divided by party lines and following their leaders blindly, are in no position to defend the interests of their class when the principal question is one of protective duties to be laid on for the benefit of the manufacturers. The consequence is that the manufacturers, who have more direct representatives in Parliament than the farmers, and having a strong organization behind them, are able to secure what they want every time at the expense of the consuming classes the majority of whom are farmers.

But the manufacturers, the railway insurance and other corporations are represented in Parliament in other ways than by their own class who hold seats there. Three fourths of all the lawyers, who sit in Parliament hold retainers for some one or other of the numerous manufacturing, railway, steamship, telegraph, telephone or insurance companies and stand ready to do wordy battle for these corporate interests at any moment. The lawyers are loyal to the clients who pay them. As for their farming constituents—well, the \$2500 indemnity is quite as sure for one Parliamentary term whether the lawyer politician votes for a high or a low tariff.

If the farmers of the country were to take thought of their position as consumers, and were to hold an independent attitude between parties, electing intelligent and broad-minded men of their own calling to represent them, it is clear that they might easily double their influence in Parliament and protect the agricultural interests in a manner hitherto unknown in Canadian politics. But, of course, if they choose to go on as they have been doing they will be ground up between the upper and nether millstones of manufacturing and corporate interests as they have been heretofore.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

POWNAI MAIL SERVICE.

Sir:—I understand that, owing to an evening train service on the Murray Harbor Railroad, it is the intention of the Post Office Department to deprive Pownal and Alexandra of their usual morning mail. Now, there is, on the line of economy, no necessity for so doing, therefore I protest against such a retrograde move.

As the mails have to be carried, by courier, from Hillsboro to Alexandra Pownal, Village Green and Cherry Valley, why not have the courier leave Charlottetown in the morning, as usual, drop the mails for Marmad, Bethel, Mt. Herbert, Bunbury, Cross Roads, and Kinloch at the Hillsboro Consolidated School, whence the vandrivers could distribute them at the different offices on their return home, thus giving the consolidated districts a morning mail service of their own? Or, better still, let the residents of last mentioned districts have boxes at their gates, where the vandrivers might drop the mails, the residents of course paying a certain yearly sum for such service.

Thus the petty offices throughout those districts might be dispensed with, and the scheme of consolidation furthered.

Now, Mr. Editor as you are always helping forward the advancement of the Province, I hope you will take up this matter and discuss it in your paper.

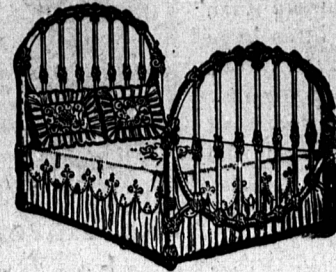

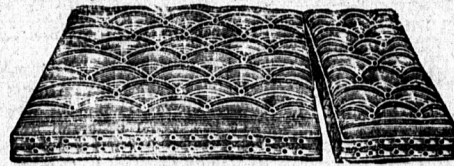

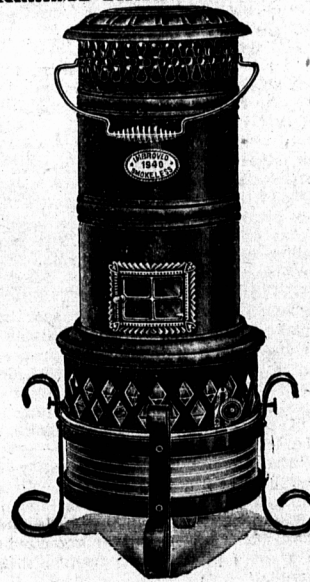
