THE marriage took place on Wednesday the 7th inst at the residence of R. S. Carruthers, Carleton, of Miss Sadie Robertson, daughter of the late John Scott Robertson and sister of Principal Robertson of the Prince of Wales College to Dr. John Lowther formerly of the firm of Lowther & Leard, dentists, Summerside, and now of Edmonton, Rev. James McDougall officiated. Only a few of the immediate relatives and intimate friends of the contracting parties were present. The Guardian extends congratulations.

A WRIT has been issued in the suit of W. E. Stavert, liquidator of the Bank of Yarmouth, against John Lovitt, S. A. Crowell, Augustus Cann, J. Bradford Cann and J. Leslie Lovitt, directors of the bank, for a declaration that the defendants were guilty of the breach of trust and negligence as directors and for payment of money lost by said bank. The amount is about half a million dollars. The suit is in the interest of the shareholders to seek to recover their losses from the directors. A call has been made for the double liability.

W. E. STAVERT, general manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, has resigned to accept an important position in the Bank of Montreal, and his resignation has been accepted by the bank. Mr. Stavert is in the prime of life, and began his banking training with his father in the Bank of Summerside, which was absorbed by the bank of New Brunswick when he became its general manager. For a few months in 1881 he was in the Royal Bank at Halifax, but in that year he joined the Bank of Nova Scotia. He was sent to open the Jamaica branch of that institution in 1889, and when it was on a firm footing he was asked to open the branch at Newfoundland in 1894. That branch being well established, he was transferred to Boston in 1898 to open the branch there, where he remained until appointed general manager of the Bank of New Brunswick in 1901.

When the Bank of Yarmouth suspended, Mr. Stavert was the man selected as curator by the Bankers' Association. Ten years ago the provincial government appointed him one of the commissioners to draft a new assessment bill for the province. The Bank of Montreal, like many other banks, make it a rule to advance the men in its own service, and rarely go outside its own staff. But Mr. Clouston is known to be pre-eminently a judge of character, and shows it by placing in a position of authority a man of Mr. Stavert's ability and wide experience. Mr. Stavert last evening said to the Sun that he was not in a position to give any information concerning his retirement from the Bank of New Brunswick. Several of the directors of the Bank, however, not denying the story of Mr. Stavert's resignation, preferred to let himself make any statements regarding it.—St. John Sun.
