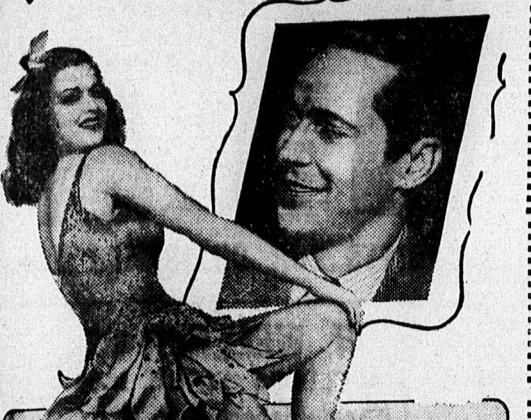

LEGION DANCE — Another successful Tuesday night dance was held in the Canadian Legion Rooms' last evening as hundreds of service men with their lady friends gathered for the occasion. Members of the Navy, Army and Air Force spent an enjoyable night dancing to the music of Bill More-side's orchestra. The dance was under the supervision of Mr. A. G. Bruce, Entertainment Officer of the Canadian Legion War Service.

HERE FROM SEATTLE — After an absence of 26 years Mr. Oliver Myers, brother of Hon. John C. Myers, is visiting the Province and renewing old friendships. Mr. Myers is on the staff of the Forestry Department, and is taking a long anticipated visit to his native health. He sees many improvements both in country and city, being especially impressed with the excellent traffic regulations in Charlottetown.

TRUCK BADLY BURNED — A large motor truck was badly damaged when it caught fire at a service station on the Malpeque Road about 4.30 yesterday afternoon. The machine, which belongs to Mr. Percy Downie, proprietor of the station, was pushed out to the street when the blaze started and the firemen were called. A stream of water from one of the fire hoses succeeded in extinguishing the blaze which threatened to destroy the vehicle. The cab was badly gutted but the engine and rest of the body escaped serious damage. The origin of the fire was not known.

SEIZING CARS — More than one hundred motor cars have been seized by City Police since the drive to collect personal property taxes started. Many of the vehicles have been released as owners paid up but some are still held at the city pound. Meanwhile the drive to collect the back taxes continues. Const. A. J. Dowling is in charge of this work. Authority to seize motor vehicles for arrears of personal property taxes was obtained by the city from the provincial legislature two years ago. Last summer and autumn the first drive was launched and \$3500 in tax arrears were actually seized but many owners were taken to the city hall by police officials. When they paid their taxes they were permitted to drive their cars away. This year a similar practice is being followed. 110 cars have been taken into custody briefly to be released within an hour as the owners arranged settlement. At present less than 10 machines remain in the city pound.

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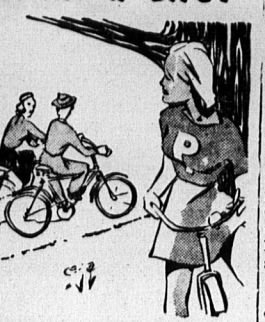

Gives outline Of Boys' work

"Boys don't stop being born or growing up because there is a war on," said Mr. Nelson McEwen, National Boy's Work Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of Canada at a Director's meeting of the local Y. M. C. A. last night. He arrived in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon and will be here several days reviewing the boy's work program.

Mr. McEwen who is a native of Prince Edward Island, is well known in Charlottetown where he spent many years. At last night's meeting, he stressed the importance of the boy's work in war time and pointed out the need of improving the quality of it. The important thing is not to get the boy off the street but to give him a training in the Y. M. C. A. he told the directors. The aim is the development of leadership. For the older boys, a special club is being formed while the younger boys must be taught how to play games properly. They must be taught to develop sportsmanship.

The visiting Boy's Work Secretary stressed the need of educating boys in actual democratic living today—not ten years from now.

Mr. D. J. Howell, chairman of the Executive, presided in the absence of Mr. J. M. McEwen. Mr. McEwen was born at Souris but lived in Charlottetown since he was about three years old. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Douglas McEwen. His father was a well-known island locomotive engineer with the C. N. R.

Mr. McEwen is a member of the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. of Canada. He will address the local Y. M. C. A. meeting Thursday evening.

While here he is staying with his sister, Mrs. C. J. Wood, Bunbury in Charlottetown. Mrs. H. D. Howatt, resides in this city.

Fine Piano Recital given By Miss Morris

Last night in St. Paul's Hall Miss Marion Morris gave a delightful piano recital in aid of the Red Cross. The event, which was held under the auspices of the Women's Music Club, was much enjoyed by a large and discriminating audience. The program was as follows:

- Cari Weber—Perpetual Motion, Beethoven—Sonata in C Minor, Op. 13 (Pathétique).
- Chopin—Study No. 5 (Black Key Etude)
- Berceuse in D Flat Major, Waltz in E Flat Major, Fantasia Impromptu, Polonaise in A Major
- Liszt—Waltz in A Major, Rubenstein—Staccato Study in C Major

It will be noted that the works played by Miss Morris are nearly all compositions of the 19th Century and were quite familiar to her audience—a fact which, perhaps, added even more to the pleasure of the listeners.

The most significant composition is undoubtedly the Beethoven Sonata in C Minor, Opus 13, called (but not by Beethoven) "Pathétique". Miss Morris played this beautifully and with true musical discernment. Her rendition of the slow movement (Adagio Cantabile) was particularly pleasing, and she brought the lovely and touching melody, which forms the principal portion of the music, to the ears of her hearers with excellent intonation and true artistry.

Those who have been so fortunate as to hear Mr. Fred Morris play Chopin, will not be surprised at the understanding sympathy and technical proficiency with which his daughter played the Chopin group. All were well done, but to this listener, Miss Morris's playing of the Fantasia Impromptu and the Polonaise in A Major appealed particularly.

In response to hearty and continuing applause, Miss Morris played as encore numbers, Czerny's Velocity Study for the left hand, Mendelssohn's "Spinning Song," and her own arrangement of the Blue Danube Waltzes and "Old Black Joe."

Miss Morris is to be congratulated on the excellent transcription for piano which she has made of these two familiar pieces. Many people of musical taste will prefer her arrangement of the Blue Danube, in particular, to the Schiz-Evler and similar sensational and pyrotechnic arrangements, so beloved of virtuosi—and would-be virtuosi.

The Women's Music Club are to be congratulated and thanked for having presented Miss Morris in this fine recital.
