## KILLED AT ELLERSLIE

### Julius McDonald, a Brakeman

### ONE LEG WAS CRUSHED

### Six Wheels Passed Over it—Amputation was The Only Hope and That Proved Fatal—Much Regret Among The Railway Men.

A SAD accident occurred yesterday at Ellerslie station, by which Mr. Julius McDonald, of Richmond, lost one of his legs and received other injuries. In crossing the track his foot had caught in the frog and while thus held a car which was being switched off caught him. He saw the car in time to throw himself off the track and the wheel passed over his leg, cutting it off at the knee. He was carried into the station and an engine and car despatched for Dr. McLaughlin and McEwen, O'Leary, Dr McPhail, of Summerside, was also taken up by a special train. They found it necessary to amputate the leg above the knee. His other injuries are not serious and at latest account he was resting well. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. McDonald who his only recently recovered from a severe attack of rheumatic fever. He has been about a year in the employ of the P. E. I. R.

LATER AT CHARLOTTETOWN.

The officials on the express brought the sad intelligence that the unfortunate man had died about 9 o'clock last night. He had just taken out the coupling pin at Ellerslie and stepping out of the way, his foot caught in the frog of the track. The four wheels of the tender and two of the engine in backing passed over his leg just above the knee crushing flesh, bones and cloth into a jelly and tearing a large piece of flesh out of the other leg. His heart it was thought had been weakened by rheumatic fever from which he suffered all winter. Consequently he could not bear amputation. He was formerly a school teacher and went on the road last fall. Sadness was stamped on the countenances of many of the railway men last night, when they heard of his death, for the deceased was a particular favorite with all of them.
