The solitary ice boat on the Cape Traverse side left yesterday morning at eleven o'clock for the mainland. After going three quarters of the way over a heavy storm sprang up and the crew were compelled to return to the Island. They reached Cape Traverse about five o'clock.

The Guardian learns with deep regret of the death in Montague yesterday of Daniel Yesser, one of the old and respected residents of the eastern town.
