A SPECIAL train will leave here Monday morning at 6 o'clock local for Summerside for the purpose of carrying Island exhibits to the St. John Exhibition. On arrival of boat at Point du Clée, a special train will be in readiness to carry exhibits to St. John.

THE GUARDIAN has received an advance copy of a lecture entitled "Tennyson's message to our generation" delivered last winter by the late Rev. D. Sutherland. Mr. Sutherland was an intense admirer of this "poet prophet of the nineteenth century" and his rare culture enabled him to speak with authority on anything pertaining to the world of literature. He believed Tennyson to be preeminently "the poet of beauty," taking us "behind the creeds and the forms about which the conflicts of controversy have raged to the living spirit that inspired them all, and making us feel how passing and temporary are the creeds and forms and how eternal is the love of God." Mr. Sutherland's ability as a writer and his mastery of the subject is evident on every page of the lecture. It should be read by thousands of our people to whom its intrinsic value cannot fail to be a source of pleasure. The closing words of the author, now applicable to himself, will appeal to the hearts of the people among whom he labored and by whom he was so sincerely loved. "Alfred Tennyson has crossed the bar and now he sees his Pilot face to face. Though he has gone from earth for ever the message of Duty and Beauty, of God and Immortality, he sang so sweetly and powerfully, remains to gladden and strengthen humanity." The pamphlet is now on sale at the City bookstores. It is clearly printed on good paper, the work of Messrs. Hazard & Moore, and has for a frontispiece an admirable likeness of the deceased author.
