WARNER BROS. COMEDY FILM "THE VOICE OF THE TURTLE" IS NEW ATTRACTION

Look closely when you see Warner Bros' lively comedy, "The Voice of the Turtle."

Director Irving Rapper, who is noted for his use of a characteristic piece of business in his motion pictures, has a new one for "The Voice of the Turtle," Warner Bros. romantic comedy starring Eleanor Parker and Ronald Reagan which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre.

The new trick is Miss Parker's habit of filling two glasses—one for herself and one for Reagan—then drinking out of the fuller one to even it up with the other.

Miss Parker does this with two glasses of milk, two glasses of cognac, and two glasses of champagne. She doesn't measure up the glasses by simply pouring the liquid from one to the other; she invariably slips them to equality.

Director Rapper's first attention-getting device of the sort was the cigarette routine in "Now Voyager," when Paul Henreid lit two cigarettes—one for himself and one for Bette Davis.

Last year Rapper had a triple-kiss routine in "Deception," wherein the same Bette Davis kissed the same Paul Henreid on his forehead, the tip of the nose, and the chin.

The Parker-Reagan routine is less intimate, Rapper says, but more effective for comedy purposes.

SUGAR STOCKS INCREASE

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(CP)—Canada's sugar stocks rose to 232,428,000 pounds at the end of October, compared with 217,008,000 pounds at the corresponding date a year ago, the Bureau of Statistics reported Saturday. The advance was caused by increased holdings of refined sugar which rose from 78,669,000 pounds a year ago to 103,961,000. Raw sugar stocks fell from 138,338,000 pounds to 128,448,000.

Historic Site At St. Croix Island

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20—(AP)—The National Park service notified Senator Owen Brewster, (Rep.-Me.) today that tiny St. Croix island in Maine, the first settlement in Acadia has been officially designated an historic site.

Approval of the site as a national shrine has been sought several years by Brewster and members of the Maine congressional delegation.

The property now will be deeded to the United States Government by Mr. and Mrs. Barrett Farner and Charles E. Bernard, co-owners of the island.

St. Croix Island is on the Maine side of St. Croix river, which forms the boundary between Maine and New Brunswick. It is near Passamaquoddy bay and was the site of the first European settlement in the northeast.

On June 26, 1604, an expedition under Sieur de Monts and Samuel de Champlain landed on St. Croix Island.

The party had sailed from France to satisfy the ambitions of Sieur de Monts who had been interested in futile attempts to plant a French colony on the St. Lawrence.

The cartographer and historian obtained a grant from the King of France giving him a monopoly on all fur trade in Acadia, extending from Cape Breton to Pennsylvania.

Early development of the Island included about a dozen houses arranged around a court, and connected by a strong wall to form a fort. The plan has been preserved and it is planned to reconstruct the primitive community.

A severe winter followed the building of the settlement. After heavy casualties Sieur de Monts changed the location of the settlement and colonists abandoned the island.

PERCY EDWARD MACINNIS

The funeral service, which was held at the Cutcliffe Funeral Home on Thursday, October 22nd, was largely attended and was conducted by the Rev. W. E. Dudley, D. D., and the Rev. G. Carlyle Webster.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Roy Bevan, Sterling MacDonald, Lloyd Head, Clarence MacInnis, Alfred MacNeill and John Square-briggs.

There are left to mourn his passing, his beloved wife, nee Miss Pauline MacKinnon, his parents Mr. and Mrs. Seymour MacInnis, three brothers, Ralph, Frank, Harry, all of this city and four sisters, Erna (Mrs. S. L. Taylor, Moncton); May, (Mrs. Harry MacInnis, Lethbridge, Alta.); Freda (Mrs. William Porter, Dorval, Que.), and Isabelle, (Mrs. Leith Jay, Charlottetown).

Interment was made in the People's Cemetery.
