Liability For Wife's Debts Is Subject

Mr. James Haslam was the speaker at the weekly supper meeting of the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club last night. He gave an interesting address on "the liability of the husband for the debts of his wife contracted before or during marriage". The law in this province is based largely on the old English common law except as it has been modified by Provincial or Dominion statutes, the speaker said. Of debts contracted by the wife before marriage the husband is liable to the extent he was enriched by the marriage. Of debts contracted after marriage in a general way the husband is liable. Each case however, must be decided on its merits and on the circumstances, Mr. Haslam said. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker.

FIRE DESTROYS BUILDING AT UPTON AIRPORT

A 60 by 20 foot building containing office, waiting room, store room and workshop of the Canadian Airways at Upton Airport was completely destroyed by fire at noon yesterday. Mr. Walter Fowler, superintendent of the Canadian Airways here said last night that the estimated loss of equipment would be in the vicinity of \$3,000. The origin of the blaze was unknown. The plane for Moncton had just been taken from the hangar to be turned up and the pilot was returning to the office for papers when he discovered the centre of the building in flames.

The nearby hangar and gas storage building were scorched by the flames and airport officials were forced to throw snow on the buildings to prevent them catching fire. They were hampered in their efforts to fight the flames owing to a shortage of water. The water supply from a bored well was located in the burning workshop.

The building was owned by Dr. J. S. Jenkins. It was partly covered by insurance. Pilots Fowler and Terrie and Chief Engineer Powell also lost some personal belongings in the blaze. Personal equipment lost included navigating instruments and an aerial camera.

Despite the fire which occurred less than an hour before the take off of the plane for Moncton left on schedule at 12.45.

Construction of a new building to replace the one burned would be begun shortly. Dr. Jenkins announced last night. Yesterday a building was purchased from a nearby farmer and would be hauled to the airport to serve as temporary office and workshop, he said.

their once beautiful city.
Much of the business district was nothing but a smouldering pile of wreckage.

There was no way of estimating even remotely the dead in the day's bombardments, but the morgue was stacked high with mutilated bodies of men, women and children.
The Defence Council announced: "They may reduce the city to ruins, but we'll defend those ruins to our last man."

CLAIM VICTORIES

MADRID, Nov. 19—(CP-Havas)—General Jose Miaja's defence council tonight claimed victories in the air and in University City, northwest of the capital.
While Government fliers were bringing down 6 insurgent planes, Leftist artillery and infantry recaptured part of University City, an official communique said.
Reinforcements and new artillery recaptured the capital attacked to the new medical college, the French owned Casa Velasquez, the new philosophy faculty headquarters and the agricultural school, according to the Government announcement.

Authorities said the San Christiana asylum was surrounded and the Insurgents inside it trapped.
