A TEST OF BOILERS.

LONDON, May 29.—An interesting test of boilers has been arranged by the parliamentary boiler committee, which has ordered a full-speed trial between the second class cruiser Hyacinth, of 5,600 tons displacement, fitted with Belleville boilers, and the second class cruiser Minera, of the same tonnage, fitted with Scotch boilers. The two vessels will start simultaneously from a home port and run to Gibraltar, with the object of determining which class of boiler can stand best strain of a long run at high pressure.

Prospects are Brightening This Year

GOOD WORK GOING ON

The Gospel Meetings—Athletic Classes—The Financial Outlook.

The many friends of the city Y. M. C. A. will be glad to know that it is in a flourishing condition, and if the work continues to grow as it has during the past few months a bright future is in store for it. Our citizens in general are always ready to support an institution that has a specific work to do in helping to make the city better and make better citizens of its young men. Those who have followed the work being done in the Y. M. C. A. are convinced that it deserves to live, and will be glad to help in any way possible to attain that end. Even those who have been most pessimistic with regard to the future of the work acknowledge that what has been done during the past months makes the institution worthy of the support of the public.

The building while not very attractive outwardly is bright and cheerful within and is now an attractive resort where young men may spend pleasant evenings in the midst of surroundings that cannot be questioned.

Thanks to the efforts of the enthusiastic Ladies' Auxiliary the parlor is now very comfortable and attractive. The reading room also has been put in good condition and can compare favourably with any in the lower Provinces. Well supplied with the leading papers, magazines, and illustrated papers it should be more largely patronized by the citizens. It is doubtless due to a lack of knowledge of its attractions that more do not take advantage of its opportunities for spending a pleasant hour. The old fashioned magazine holders have given place to those of the most modern kind which are much more convenient and attractive.

The large hall on the top floor has been used as a gymnasium, and the classes, ten in number each week, under the leadership of the General Secretary have proved very beneficial. These include classes for young men, business men, boys, students, and ladies. In these days of mental strain, robust bodies are an absolute necessity, and this is best obtained by taking systematic exercise under a competent instructor. The quality of the work done was seen in the two public exhibitions that were given during the season, when the members of the class were admired for their strength and agility, and the graceful manner in which they perform the exercises.

The third word of the name is not to be forgotten for it is a "Christian" Association, and as such aims to keep the Spiritual side of the work before the young men in a manner that will attract them. Each Sunday afternoon gospel meetings for men only are held, and during the winter season were largely attended. Already a number of young men have been brought into living contact with the Saviour and have united with city churches. This is the highest object of all and it is for this that the Association exists, that men may be made better, and more like Him who was the perfect Man.
