## Interprovincial Good Roads Parley Concludes

**OTTAWA, May 31.** (By the Canadian Press)—Following a discussion lasting two days and covering a variety of matters respecting the maintenance and use of Canadian highways, the annual interprovincial conference on highways concluded this afternoon.

The 19th annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association, which sponsored the conference, will be held in Halifax on Sept. 12, 13 and 14, next at the invitation of the Nova Scotia Government.

S. L. Squire of Toronto, chairman of the executive committee of the Canadian Good Roads Association, presided over the conference here. Representatives were present from Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Saskatchewan, while public or semi-public bodies represented included the following: Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways, Canadian Engineering Standards Association, Canadian Association of Tourist and Publicity Bureau, Canadian Automobile Association, Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce and Canadian Automobile Underwriters Association.

Provinces not directly represented co-operated with the work by forwarding suggestions and information. Hon. Percy C. Black, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia, contributed a report on experiments in dust-laying on gravel roads and stated that, after testing salt, oil, and calcium chloride, the latter was found most efficient. This was not perfect, however and it was urged that further experiments be undertaken as it was believed that gravel would continue to form a major portion of all road systems for considerable time to come.

The conference discussed gasoline "bootlegging" and smuggling and decided to impress upon the Dominion Government to take whatever steps possible to guard against this evil. Reports on winter road maintenance were heard and it was shown that in Ontario and Quebec the demand for open roads in the winter time was increasing. The experience in Ontario last winter was that the tourist traffic was maintained through the winter at about forty to fifty per cent of the summer volume.

Other matters occupying the conference included highway beautifying, elimination of unsightly signs, safety measures, placing of sidewalks on highway bridges, and uniformity of highway regulations among the provinces.

## Amendment To Revenue Bill Is Rejected

**WASHINGTON, May 31.** (A.P.)—An amendment to the revenue bill to levy additional duties on imports from countries whose currency has depreciated, was rejected tonight by the United States Senate.

The amendment offered by Senator Jones, Republican, Wash., was defeated without a record vote.

It would have levied a compensatory duty of one percent for each one per cent of depreciation in the currency of a country exporting to the United States.

Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, threatened indefinite delay in enactment of the tax bill if the amendment were adopted.
