two weeks holidays in the fall. He considered no child should go to get this fall vacation. Mr. J. F. Proffitt was very much in favor of consolidation, but thought no radical change could be made.

As regards small schools Mr. Proffitt considered that if a school could not maintain an average of twenty pupils, the Department of Education should at once take up the matter, as the cost was practically doubled. The prejudice against closing small schools was not justified. Mr. Proffitt also advocated a grade eleven for all existing high schools on the Island. Many boys and girls whose parents cannot afford the cost of sending them to Prince of Wales College could take the Grade Eleven course which is equivalent to the first year at Prince of Wales, at a much lower cost.

Mrs. MacLean in her evidence stated that the present teacher training course was totally inadequate and that a Normal School such as they have in other Provinces should be established. Mr. MacDonald in giving his evidence said that he agreed with the others that notification of change of school books was very necessary. For instance he was opening his own school at Kensington tomorrow and did not know until Monday that there was to be a new geography. In answer to Dr. MacMillan, as far as he knew there was no text book committee with representatives from the teachers. Mr. MacDonald added that a general appeal from the teachers had once been made for new Grammar and Arithmetic books and it had taken the authorities five years to bring the change about. It was the general opinion of the meeting that the present system was in dire need of radical alterations.

that the school supply department should see that the books were ready. As regards text books Dr. Tanton considered the grammar was unnecessarily changed as the terminology in the new one was different and the teachers had to learn the terms of the new book. It would be a very great advantage to have an eleventh grade at Summerside but no certificate to teach should be given from that Grade. To improve the present system of education it would be necessary to begin with the parents and there would be trouble about salary. If the parents were more interested in the education of their children there should also be more interest taken by the trustees. Dr. Tanton was very decidedly in favor of higher salaries for all teachers. In his opinion that was the only way to have an efficient teaching staff. Dr. McPhee was the next witness and agreed with Dr. Tanton that the salaries were too low. He considered the major part of the increase should be paid by the Government. The rural districts, in his opinion, should pay a little more than they are now paying. A sliding scale of salaries based on quality and service should be adopted. Dr. McPhee thought that the Inspectors Report as published by the Department of Education annually was very vague and that the trustees should be notified when the Inspector is visiting the school.

Heroic Act To Be Rewarded

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 13.—The heroic act of William Fraser Cooke, of Garden of Eden, Pictou, Co. Nova Scotia, an axeman employed by the Canadian National Railways on the Sunny Brae-Guysboro Railway, in saving a fellow member of a survey party, Robert Nickerson of Moncton, N. B., employed as a chairman, from drowning while on the survey on Tuesday, July 23, last, is to be suitably rewarded. The members of the survey party engaged on this railway line are presenting Mr. Cooke with a gold watch bearing an inscription on the back relating to the event. A. S. Gunn, construction engineer of the Canadian National Railways, is proceeding to Newtown, Pictou Co., N. S., to make the presentation on Thursday next, August fifteenth.

The circumstances under which the deed was accomplished render the act more praiseworthy. On the evening in question both parties went in bathing, at Eden Lake, and after diving a few times, both started to swim to shore. On reaching shore Cooke noticed Nickerson apparently in distress but before Cooke could reach him Nickerson had disappeared from view. Guided by the air bubbles, Cooke dived and managed to get hold of Nickerson and bring him to the surface. Nickerson in some way obtained a hold on Cooke's neck which impeded the latter, in fact they both went under several times but Cooke managed eventually to get Nickerson ashore and collapsed. Several members of the survey party were by this time on the shore and they succeeded in resuscitating Nickerson and carried him to the camp. Cook's name has been placed before the Royal Humane Society to receive the award of that body for acts of this kind. A unique feature is that Cooke had just attained his eighteenth birthday on the day of his heroic rescue.
