BRITISH TRADE SHOWS LARGE INCREASE. LONDON, May 7—The April statement of the Board of Trade shows an increase of \$42,820,000 in imports, and a decrease of \$24,026,000 in exports. The principal increase in the imports were \$17,500,000 in American cotton, \$6,250,000 in wool, and \$10,000,000 in food stuffs. Coal, iron, steel and manufactured goods showed the largest decreases in exports.
