Muffins

WHAT MEN ARE WEARING BY JOHN BRAYTON

NEW YORK, July 6.—The vacation period is in full swing and the question of holiday clothes is uppermost in the minds of men, perhaps every bit as much as it is with the women, even if the men are more reluctant to admit it.

One of the most noticeable features of the vacation styles for men this year is the popularity of the short knickers, which have always been a distinguishing mark of the English sportsman or out of doors man. In the leading men's furnishings stores of New York, knickers in great variety are being displayed prominently. Among the most popular materials used in their making are Irish homespun and corduroy. All kinds of rough tweeds are being shown, but brown or brown mixtures are unquestionably the favorites.

The knickers are being worn in two distinct styles, each with an apparently equal following. The knee, with a narrow band, which is concealed by the voluminous fall of the pants leg. The other is less ample, the quantity of material and ends in broad bands three inches in depth, which are fastened in front by the small buttons.

With this comfortable garment are worn thick woolen stockings, which are shown in a great variety of course ribbed grays, browns, and heather mixtures. Where the narrow knee-band trousers are worn the stockings have an ample turn-over, generally of a plaid design or in fairly large checks.

Two varieties of coats are being of the loose Norfolk type, with very worn with these knickers. One is

ample pockets and softly rolled lapels. The other is of the more conventional sack type but also with large pockets and built more loosely and with greater fullness than the customary business suit sack. A cap usually completes this costume, although the soft Fedora is seen just as frequently. Of course, a stiff collar would be completely out of place with this very informal costume. By far the most popular style of neckwear is the collar which is attached to the shirt and of the same material. In regard to color, khaki shirts are easily in first place, but tan and green are being widely worn. A novelty in scarfs, which is meeting with decided favor, is an approach to the old-time stock of our grandfathers. These scarfs, shown in fancy and plain silk, are wound twice about the neck and tied in a big throw-over which is held in place by a plain gold sporting pin, such as a miniature hunting crop or oar.

Another novelty in ties, which seems to be meeting with considerable success, is a bat-winged bow in crocheted and knit silk. Several attempts have been made from time to time to popularize the bat-winged tie, but this is the first time one of them has made any real headway. The ties are made with either square or pointed ends and mostly in solid colors. The majority of those seen were in brown, gun, navy, and royal blue.

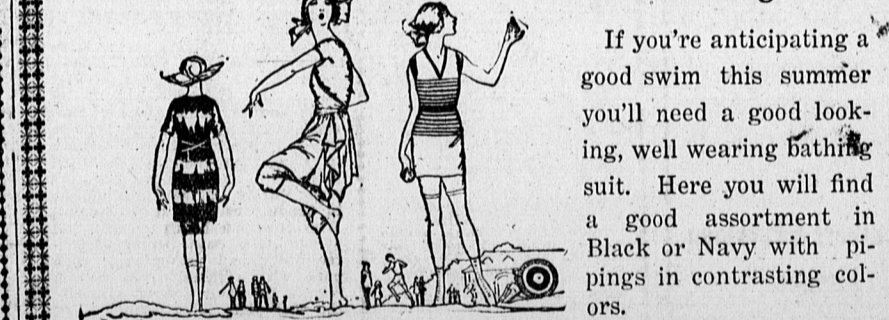
